Monday last, marched hence.  
The Tipperary Regiment left Plymouth, on Sun-  
day, for Ireland.

In consequence of the alteration in the departure

each evening. On Sundays opens at 9 o'clock, and  
closes at 10, and the same hours after the Dublin  
Mail arrives, as on week days.
