We are concerned to hear that the spirit of dis-
obedience to the Laws continues to manifest itself by
constant fighting of Cians at Fairs—Two men and
a woman were dangerously hurt at Ballybrood, on
Monday last, and the Fair-Green exhibited a tremen-
dous scene of riot in the evening.

At the fair of Newport, County Tipperary, on
Thursday last, there was a sanguinary conflict be-
tween two parties, and the fight was so desperate
that exclusive of several broken heads and wounds,
a man named William Coffee, a Carpenter, was killed
on the spot. John Evans, Esq of Ashrow, with his
usual acuity endeavored to quell the disturbances,
which at length with the co-operation of the Rev.
John Pennefather, and other gentlemen, they were
with difficulty enabled to effect, and they happily
succeeded in apprehending John Mulcahy, Martin
Ahern, Patrick Ahern, James Ryan, (Rue), Martin
Murnane, Pat. Fouue, William Quilty, and Michael
Bourke, who are charged with "being aiding and
assisting in the murder," and were last night under
an escort of the First Dragoons (King's), committed
to our County Gaol, to remain until transmitted to
Clonmel, where they are to abide their trial at the
ensuing assizes

Wednesday evening, James Bourke, who was
taken in the act of attacking, with other persons, the
out-offices of Richard Parsons, Esq. of Cragbeg, in
this County, on the 11th May, died in the County
Hospital, from the wounds he received on that night.
The Right Worshipful Mayor held an inquisition on
the body on Thursday, when, after a number of
witnesses being examined, the Jury returned a Ver-
dict of "Justifiable Homicide," in the following
words:—

"We find that James Bourke, now deceased,
and divers other persons, to the Jurors unknown,
on the 11th of May, 1815, by night, about the hours
of 10 or 11 o'Clock, at Finure, near Cragbeg, in the
County of Limerick, being riotously, seditiously,
and unlawfully assembled, wearing white bands and
badges not usually worn by his Majesty's subjects,
on their lawful occasions, and some of them armed
with fire-arms, in disturbance of the peace, and being
so tumultuously and seditiously assembled, Richard
Parsons, Esq. a Lieutenant of Yeomanry, assisted
by his servants, John Dickson, and John Hiffe, ar-
rested and secured the said James Bourke; and that
the said James Bourke, then and there obstinately
and unlawfully did resist being detained a prisoner,
and did assault the said Richard Parsons, and that
said John Hiffe, justifiably, and in defence of his said
master and himself, did give the said James Bourke,
one mortal wound on the head, of which the said
James Bourke languished in the Gaol for the County
of Limerick, and in the Infirmary for said County,
where he died, of said wound, on the 16th day of
June Instant."
