ROMAN CATHOLIC BOARD.

Meeting of the Board took place on last Saturday, the expected motion of Counsellor O'Gorman, address to the Spanish Cortes, to intercede with the Spanish Legislature in behalf of the Catholics of Ireland was discussed. He concluded a long speech, and proposed the following Resolution:—

That the Resolution of the Aggregate Meeting, proposing an application to the Spanish Cortes, entreat- ing mediation with the British Government, on behalf of their suffering Brethren, the Catholics of Ire- land, now referred to a Committee of twenty one, members of the same, and report their opinion and propose the best mode of carrying it into effect."

Counsellor O'Connell seconded the Resolution, and in favor of its immediate adoption on the ground of expediency.

The Resolution, after several Gentlemen had delivered their sentiments, was passed by acclamation!!

After attending the various Lodges they all proceeded to Church, where they heard a Sermon, and then repaired to their respective houses. —Forty-two Orange Lodges met in the village of Marelin, on the same day. The Orange hedge, Boyne, Moira, and Marelin Yeop- ers fired a feu de joye on the occasion, and the day terminated without a single accident.
