Daughter of an Army Officer residing at Greenwich, on Saturday eloped with a young Sailor, and has not been heard of.

Thursday last, a most respectable Jury was summoned by the Right Worshiptul Andrew Watson, Esq. Mayor, as Coroner, to hold an Inquest on the body of William Davoren, Corporal in the Shropshire Regiment of Militia, who had died on Wednesday night, in the Military Hospital, in Dominick-Street; the Coroner and Jury, anxious to procure every information on the subject, after sitting for nine hours, and examining eight witnesses, adjourned to Friday, when, at two o'clock, they returned the following Verdict:—"That William Davoren came to his death by means of some person or persons unknown, having, on the 23d of July last, at Cratie, in the County Clare, struck him a blow with a spade, or some sharp weapon, giving him therewith a mortal wound on the right side of the head and skull, of which he instantly languished, and that he died of said mortal wound, on the 23th Instant—And so we present, that persons unknown, did wilfully kill and murder the said William Davoren, in manner aforesaid"—Davoren was a native of the County Galway.

On Wednesday, the Mayor received private information, that one or two of the gang, (who on the night of the 26th of April last, broke into the house of Edmund Naughten, at Farenshone, North Liberties of this City, cruelly maimed and beat him and his wife, so much, that the former lay in the County Infirmary with little hope of recovery) were employed in the works at Scatterry:—sent for Mr. Murphy, High Constable, and after planning an arrangement, the High Constable, accompanied by Naughten, sailed on Thursday morning in the Lady Frances Packet, for Kilrush, and were favored with a wind that landed them there in five hours; on arrival at Kilrush, they were most cordially assisted by Thomas Hunt, Esq. a Magistrate for the County of Clare, who went himself, with the crew of his wherry, into Scatterry Island, accompanied by a corporal's guard of the Shropshire Militia, and fortunately secured two principals of the gang, Patrick Heher and Matthew Kenny, who were fully identified by Naughten; also Michael Grady, a deserter from the 41st regiment, of whom Mr. Murphy had information of being in the island; and we are happy to add, that the three culprits, accompanied by the Peace Officer, and four of the military, arrived yesterday evening, in the same Packet, after a similar quick passage, and were safely lodged in the City Jail—the two former to abide trial at the ensuing Assizes—the deserter was handed over to the military depot;—the Mayor feels pleasure in returning public Thanks to Mr. Hunt, for his prompt assistance as well as to the Master of the Lady Frances Packet, for the attention paid by him to Mr. Murphy, a well on going to, as returning from, Kilrush.
