American Privateer off our Coast.

On Monday evening at 6 o'clock, the Right Hon. Mayor received an Express from Robert Farbert House, covering two Letters, the following are Copies:—

Ballyheige, Sunday, 1st Aug. 1813. I received an Express from the Commandant at Kerry Head, saying an American Privateer had captured and burned a Merchant Ship in the mouth of the Shannon, and I think I should mention the circumstance to you for the satisfaction of the Merchants of Limerick.

I have the honor to remain, SIR, Your very humble Servant, W. M. TWISS, Capt. Kerry Regt. Limerick.

Kerry Head, signal station, near Tralee, Co. Kerry. August 1st, 1813. I have the honor to acquaint you that, at Two P. M. a small Brig, mounting 18 guns, came to anchor in the mouth of the Shannon and captured a small vessel and set fire to her.

I have the honor to be, SIR, Your most Obedient Servant, R. FRISK, Commanding Officer Navy, Limerick.

On receipt of the above the Mayor has taken of these communications, and has ordered the Commercial Buildings, and an Express to be sent thence to Admiral Thornborough at Cove.

That vessel that was destroyed is supposed to be the privateer for Plymouth, laden with Provisions for the Royal Navy, by Messrs. John Kelly & Co. Limerick—several other letters exclusive of the same subject, were received by the Proprietors of the Commerce here; the Captain of the vessel well acquainted with this River, and it is supposed to have been formerly trading to our port. We are of opinion that the Lords of the Admiralty will now see the necessity of ordering a few vessels of war, to be stationed near Killrush, as really our coast has been left in a very unprotected state.

Light Dragoons sailed from Dublin for Bristol on Friday—they are to be quartered in the Barracks at Westmoreland and the Royal Radnor Regiment sailed from Dublin for Bristol on Saturday.

The Westmoreland and the Royal Radnor Regiments have replaced the Westmoreland at Tullamore, and the Monmouth occupy the Barracks at Neas.
