A circular letter from the Agent General's Office, has been transmitted to the Clerks of the Militia Meetings in the County, relative to receipts and balances for parochial rates not accounted for in their returns.

A General Order has been issued, directing that the troops related should be paid in notes of the Bank of Ireland, and that certificates from the Commanding Officers and Paymasters are required monthly from each regiment. Mr. R. Bryans, of Newry, received the following extract of a letter from Messrs. Baron Fox, and a special Jury. The question appeared of much consequence to millers, as it involved the rights of water courses. Interesting evidence was given on both sides, several witnesses attending from Dublin, when after a clear and full charge from the learned Judge, the Jury brought in a verdict for the Plaintiff of 1890l. with costs.

The accident is the more to be lamented, as Mr. J. O'Dwyer is a young gentleman universally esteemed and regarded, and of most promising talents and genius, having obtained the Science Premium in Trinity College about six years since.
