On Saturday, Richard Martin, Esq was found guilty in the Town Court of Galway, upon the information, some time since preferred against him in the Court of King's Bench, by the Right Hon. Hon. Denis Bowes Daly, for having endeavoured to provoke to fight a duel—Sentence, of course, remains to be passed upon Colonel Martin by the Court of King's Bench, in the course of the next term.

The Races, at the elegant Course of Newcastle, near this City, will commence to-morrow—The Duke of Leinster, and several Families of distinction, from different parts of Ireland, we hear, are to honor the Meeting with their presence—and we doubt not, from the general polite attention of the Steward, Mr. O'Brien, that there will be every degree of regularity observed—The horses that are entered for each day's Race, are of the first blood—many capital horses passed through here yesterday, for the course.

Sunday last, the Right Worshipful Mayor, held an Inquest on the body of John Magrath, Cooper, at Boherbuoy, who died on Saturday night last; after an investigation of four hours, and examination of 3 witnesses, the Jury which was respectable, unanimously agreed to the following Verdict:—“That said Magrath came to his death by means of one Denis Molony, a Watchman, at Newtown, in the suburbs of said City, having on the night of 12th inst. at Newtown aforesaid, in the execution of his office as a public Watchman, and with a view to the preservation of the public peace, without malice, given the said John Magrath a blow with his Watch Pole on a side of his head, which caused a concussion on his Brain, of which he languished and died on the night of the 16th August Inst.” Molony was apprehended on Saturday night by the Mayor, and committed to the City Gaol.

It is a melancholy fact, that this is the second untimely death that has happened within a few years nearly in the same place, occasioned by Prostitutes.

Yesterday, Daniel Quane, Farmer, residing at Ballyclogh, South Liberties of this City, was convicted before the Right Worshipful Andrew Watson, Esq. Mayor, for having in his possession a Free cut on the Demesne of Edmond Morony, Esq; the penalty of £5, was inflicted by the Magistrate, half of which was handed to the Poor of Knocknegaul Parish, remainder to the Lunatic Hospital.

On Saturday evening died, at the See-house, Waterford, in his 73d year, the Right Rev. Joseph Stock, D. D. Lord Bishop of Waterford, to which See he was translated in 1810—He was consecrated Bishop of Killala in 1795, a few weeks before the landing of the French there, by whom he was made a prisoner, and continued so whilst they had possession of Killala—His education was most extensive; his piety, his mildness, and benevolence were not to be exceeded.
