The following is a copy of a letter, from an Officer engaged in storming St. Sebastian—

“Near Sebastian, 17th July, 1813.

On Sunday the 25th instant, we stormed Sebastian; entering the breach, we found the enemy so well prepared for our reception, that we were obliged to retreat with the loss of 300 killed, wounded and taken prisoners, including 14 officers killed or prisoners. However, in a few days we are again to attack the place, and resolved at all events to take it.

N. B.—Captain Taylor of his Majesty's 30th Sparshas lost his leg; Lieut. Dunlop, a quartermaster's mate and fifteen seamen wounded; besides four killed of thirty-six that were sent on shore from the Commodore's ship.”

The Growler American privateer, of 15 guns and 60 men, is taken by the Electra sloop of war, and sent to Newfoundland.

The following is an Extract of a Letter from an Officer.

“Off St. Sebastian's, 30th July.

An Officer from Lord Wellington had arrived. Severe action took place on the 28th, which lasted from half past twelve to five. Soult assaulted with about 35,000 men, and was invariably driven back; he must retire. Lord Wellington had only three divisions, the 3d, 4th, and 6th, and some Spaniards, the whole about 20,000 men. The loss is great on both sides. Three of Lord Wellington's Staff are wounded. This goes by the Sparrow. The Fancy letter will take the Officer with the General's dispatches.”

The plague has again broken out at Malta.

It is stated, that a malignant fever, bordering on plague, has broken out at Wapping.

The West India fleet arrived off Cape Clear, on Friday last.

An insurrection has broken out at Carolina.

Extract of a Letter from Cork, dated Yesterday

“The Argus, Captain Allen, is captured by the Pelican of 18 guns, and sent for Plymouth, after an action of 40 minutes, off the Saltees, in which Captain Allen lost his thigh, with several of the crew killed and wounded. The Pelican had 2 killed & wounded. The account is brought by the Leonidas frigate.—Admiral Thornborough and his Secretary, dispatched a Dragoon to town with the News”

The Waterford Chronicle of yesterday, contains the following:—

“A vessel, arrived in this harbour, has brought a report, that the Argus American privateer has been taken off Milford by the Pelican sloop of war, after a severe action, a British frigate and a smaller vessel were being at the time in sight. A similar rumour has also been received from Wexford, but we have not yet been able to ascertain the truth of the statement. The Pelican and the Leonidas were certainly out from Cork harbour in pursuit of the Argus.”
