The unanimous Thanks of the Meeting were voted to the Rev. Doctor THORPE and the Rev. B. W. MATTHIAS, for their copious and most satisfactory statement of the proceedings of the General Bible Society, and for their indefatigable and unwearied attention to its interests.

Unanimous Thanks were also voted to the Mayor, for his readiness in granting the Council Chamber, and for his constant exertion to maintain good order, and to preserve the morals of the Lower Classes.
