Limerick Races, Newcastle Course—We shall venture to assert, that neither this or any other county ever produced so brilliant a meeting as the last at Newcastle, for splendor, number and elegance of equipages—for rank, consequence, and fashion of the proprietors—for richness of scenery—excellence of the running—and in particular for the transcendent beauty of our fair country-women; nor do we know whether to have been more surprised or delighted with the regularity in which every thing was conducted by the extraordinary address and indefatigable exertions of Mr. O'Brien, the Steward, who has on the occasion, so justly received the sincere congratulations of his friends and the public. For Races that have acquired such celebrity, we thought it necessary to inquire into the cause of the dispute about the plate on the last day when ten horses started—the mare that won the first heat was Mr. Creed's Nobessa; the horse that won the second heat was Mr. O'Brien's (the Steward) Belcher, Mr. Rose's horse First Rate, running second; in running the third heat Mr. O'Brien's jockey was thrown from his horse just near the winning post, as has been alleged, by a jostle from Mr. Rose's horse—it is a rule of the Turf Club that when a cross or jostle is given in running the second heat, and when a heat has been won between two horses the winner of the heat is adjudged the plate. The jostle was offered to be proved by so many, that Mr. O'Brien's horse did not start again—Mr. Rose's walked over the course—referred to the Turf Club.
