DEATH.—At Park House, on Wednesday night, at 12 o'clock in his 68th year the Right Rev. Doctor John Young, Roman Catholic Bishop of Limerick, the duties of which he discharged for a series of years in the most pious and exemplary manner—he was much esteemed for his extensive learning and many excellent qualities.—His remains were interred this day in the burial ground of St. Patrick's Church, attended by a vast concourse, who assembled to pay the last melancholy respects to the deceased, whose virtues and endowments they so much admired.—In his 50th year, at eight o'clock, on Thursday morning, at his seat at Friarstown, in the South Liberties, in consequence of the bursting of a Blood Vessel, William Hunt, Esq. who served the office of Sheriff in 1788, and Mayor of this City in 1811—an Alderman and Charter Justice. The amiable character of Alderman Hunt, whether considered as a man of family, as a private gentleman, a landlord, or a magistrate, was always esteemed; a certain degree of gentleness and sensibility pervaded all his actions, and was ever conspicuous, and his death will be long and very extensively deplored;—His remains to be conveyed this evening, for interment in the family vault at Crecora, in this County.—Of his wounds, after the battle of Vittoria, Lieut.
