

...ive operations had taken place to that date, my remaining stationary. The Marquis Wellesley had directed that the fortifications of St. Sebastian should not only receive a thorough repair, but other works should be added so as to render them impregnable. In consequence of which order, a hundred men were daily employed from the British, Spanish and Portuguese Armies, proportionally to their respective strength. They will be completed in three months from their commencement. Our troops taking possession of the Castle, only a building was standing, nor an inhabitant remaining. Such was the demolition of a once beautiful and regularly built city, with a wealthy and crowded population. This information we received from an Officer who arrived at Beerhaven on Monday last, in his Majesty's ship Andromache, Captain Tobin, from St. Sebastian, with the Lieutenant Knight, having five hundred French soldiers on board from that port.

LIMERICK, OCTOBER 13.

Monday last, at a Meeting of the Common Council of this City, Aldermen Andrew Watson, (late Mayor) Richard Harte, Arthur Vincent, and Jos. Crips, were elected Charter Justices of the Peace of this City, for the ensuing year—The following Gentlemen, at the same time, elected Burgesses of the Corporation, viz.—Major General Augustine Fitzgibbon, M. P. for the Co. Clare; William Johnson Esq. of Coolruss; Edward O'Grady, Esq. Barrister at Law; Rev. George Studdert, of the Crescent; Daniel Gabbett, Esq. Bank Place; and William Marcus Jackson, Esq. North Strand.

Immediately after the election of Magistrates, they proceeded to the Tholsel in regalia, where they took the oaths of office—At the same time, several respectable Persons were sworn in High Constables. The Corporation, in Council, on Monday, voted the granting of a Lease for 999 years, (to be approved by Recorder D'Esterre.) to the Ballast Office, Dublin, of the Beeves Rocks, on the River Shannon, and it is intended by the Ballast Office Corporation to have a Tower, or Beacon erected for the safety and protection of vessels coming to this Port.

Sunday last, being the first after the new Mayor being sworn into office, the Corporation, in regalia, attended Divine Service at the Cathedral; on the occasion—The Mayor, Thomas F. Wilkinson, Esq. was attended to Church by the Union Freemason Lodge, No. 13, of which he is Master; they moved in proper costume, preceded by their Officers, &c. and accompanied by the Waterford band to the Cathedral, where an excellent discourse, from Psalm 133, Verse 1. and 2. was delivered by brother, the Rev. William Butler Odell—an anthem, appropriate to the occasion, was given by Mr. Osborne, which had a very fine effect—The Mayor was entertained in the evening by the Masons with a most sumptuous dinner at Swinburn's, at which every delicacy of the season was exhibited, several most suitable toasts were given, and on the Mayor's health being announced, it was drunk with the utmost enthusiasm—which was succeeded by a gratifying reply from his Worship, in which he trusted for their assistance, and hoped that his conduct during the year would meet their approbation, as he would endeavour to discharge his duty with strict impartiality, and with credit to himself and to his fellow Citizens. The company did not separate until a late hour, highly pleased with the occasion for which they met, and with the happiness that was evinced by every individual during the entertainment.

This day, the slaughtering of black Cattle commenced in this City, for his Majesty's navy. Joseph Fisher, Esq. is elected President, and Wm. White, Esq. Vice President, of the Chamber of Commerce of this City, for the ensuing year.

Monday last, the Right Worshipful Henry Sargent, Mayor of Waterford, inflicted a fine of £19 10s. on John White, High-street, baker, for not having attended at the Mayor's office, to prove the correctness of his Corn return upon oath, pursuant to the Act of Parliament.

Alderman Watson, Treasurer to the House of Industry and Hospital for Lunatics, has received Ten Shillings from the Right Worshipful Thomas F. Wilkinson, Esq. Mayor, being half a fine levied on a lad for swearing falsely that he was not an apprentice, when enlisting with a recruiting party;—the other half of the fine was given to the soldier, who discovered the deception.
