

His Majesty's packet Arabella, Capt. Porteus, arrived in our harbour this morning, with mails and dispatches from Passages, having put in in consequence of contrary winds. The dispatches for Government from the Marquis Wellington have been forwarded by Captain Clements, who came over in the Arabella, and who left Passages on the 22d Inst. Lord Wellington remains at Lezaca, and the dispatches from him are supposed to be of a mere routine nature.

It appears that our army remained stationary since his Lordship's last dispatches. Our advance under Sir John Hope, occupying the quarters of the French, who were driven out of them by the gallant Graham. Soult still commands the force in front of the British, and is fortifying himself in the neighbourhood of St. Jean de Luz. A letter from him to the Governor of Santona had been intercepted, desiring him to hold out as long as possible. Our troops are in excellent quarters.

Thursday last, the outwardbound West India fleet, consisting of 155 vessels, sailed from Cove.

On Wednesday last, several persons were summoned before Alderman Watson, on suspicion of cutting Trees on the Lands of Coolehenane, in the South Liberties, the property of George Gloster, Esq.—They were all acquitted of the alleged crime; but one of their Evidences, in his zeal to get his Friend out of a scrape, on his oath proved his having, himself, cut the Tree at night, on the Estate of T. Rose, Esq. without permission.—He was committed to the City gaol, asserting his not being able to pay the fine, and on Thursday, was enlarged, at the request of Mr. Rose, on paying a mitigated sum of 30s. which was handed over for the use of the Lunatic Hospital, which we are assured requires the immediate assistance of the Affluent.

John Cox, Esq. a Coroner of the County Limerick, held two Inquisitions this week:—On Monday, near Castletown Conyers, on Mary Ryan, who fell into a large hole in a field, which, on account of late floods, was full of water, whereby she was drowned.—The Verdict, "Accidental Death."—On Wednesday, at Broadford, near Mt. Plummer, on the body of John Leahy, farmer, who died there the day previous, in consequence of a beating he received, on Monday, from James Murphy and Daniel Collins, when returning from the fair of Tullilease, in the Co. Cork.—The Verdict, "Wifful Murder, against those Persons;—Murphy has been apprehended by Thos. Furlong, of Mt. Plummer, Esq. a Magistrate of this County.

The Right Worshipful Thomas F. Wilkinson, Esq. Mayor, gave the Treasurer to the House of Industry, one pound, being part of fines levied by his Worship.

The 2d bat. of the 8th Regt. landed at Cork from England, on Thursday.

The Royal Tyrone and Londonderry Regiments, embarked at Cove for England, on Thursday.

We regret to find, that our townsman, Captain Augustine Fitz-Gerald, of the 49th Regt. son of the late John Fitz-Gerald, Esq. an Officer frequently distinguished for his most gallant and able conduct in the Canadian war, was wounded at Fort George.—The conspicuous exploits of Lieut. Fitz-Gibbon, of the same Regt. who is also our fellow citizen, have been rewarded with a Company.—See Gazette.

John Taylor Hodges, gent. of this City, is appointed Ensign in the Kilkenny Regt.

The Mayor and Corporation and other Inhabitants of Kilkenny have voted an Address of Thanks to the Northumberland Regiment, for their most exemplary conduct, during their stay in that City, for more than 16 months.

The Newfoundland fleet, which sailed from Cork on the 3d Instant, put back to Greenock on Saturday last, in distress.

The Rev. Charles Tuohy, who was lately nominated Vicar Capitular of this City, was on Wednesday last, appointed Roman-Catholic Bishop.
