We just received the London Journals of Saturday, Monday and Tuesday.

The Plymouth Paper of Saturday contains the following:

It is, that two French frigates have gone on the rocks at Glenan Rocks—They are supposed to be the two frigates which lately made their escape, the same which had been chased by the Rippon. The ship also, and several other ships, are out for them.

Grand Naval Victory.

Last night we received intelligence from Plymouth that a telegraph communication had been made from the Admiralty to the Commander-in-Chief at that port, announcing that Admiral Young had fallen in with the French, and captured ten sail of the line, and driven them to sea. The gallant Admiral has received two medals for his services.

No further particulars were known. The intelligence had excited the most lively joy in the city of Plymouth and Dock.

We are sorry that we cannot confirm this statement, as it being totally destitute of foundation.

Nov. 9—Discharges of artillery have taken place this evening, to the inhabitants of Paris, the Emperor and King.

The Senate had an extraordinary meeting to-day, at 10 o'clock, under the Presidency of his Serene Highness the Prince Arch-Chancellor.

His Majesty the King of Westphalia arrived at Cologne on the 1st Nov.

Nov. 10—His Majesty the Emperor arrived yesterday at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, at St. Louis.

His Majesty left Mayence on the 8th, at one o'clock in the morning.

Nov. 11th—The sitting of the Senate has prolonged the regency of Her Majesty. The French Legislative Body is to meet on the 2nd December.

In consequence of the defeat by the Allies, Lord Wellington is ordered to advance into France.

The British Expedition is to be sent to Holland, under the command of General Picton—The Prince of Orange is to accompany it.

It is said that General St. Cyr is gone over to the French, and that the Crown Prince has passed the Rhine.

Several Marshals in Bonaparte's Army have sent in their Resignation.

The Bavarian General Wrede, Commander-in-Chief of the Army, is said to be mortally wounded.

On the 21st Nov. the French rear guard evacuated the fort, and marched upon the Nidda.

On the 7th Nov the situation of the main divisions of the French Army, were as follow:—

The Duke of Tarentum at Cologne, Ragusa at Mayence, Bellona at Strasburgh, and Valmy at Metz.

General Bertrand occupied the right Bank of the Rhine at Cassel. All the remainder of the Army had crossed the Rhine.

The Islands of Dominica and Guadaloupe have been visited with a very dreadful and destructive hurricane.

On the 13th Nov. the Emperor has addressed a proclamation to the French people on the present favorable juncture, showing off the despotism of Bonaparte.
