Ireland has never known so mischievous a system, and can never know a worse. May the merited odium which pursues the Duke, warn his Successors against trampling upon the rights of petition, outraging the feelings of a good gallant People, or ministering to the base arts of intrigue, intolerance and injustice.

Martin Kirwan, Esq. of Dalgin, has announced his intention of standing a Candidate for the Co. Mayo. Rewards of £1,200, have been offered by the Nobles and Gentry of the County Longford, for the Persons who burned the Haggard of Mr. W. L. Galbraith, the 1st inst. The Lord Lieutenant has offered £100 reward, and a free pardon for information also. The Gentry of the County Longford have formed an association to prevent a recurrence of such outrage by large descriptions to gain information, &c.

LIMERICK, NOVEMBER 24.

A letter from Rostock, dated 27th October, states that the 2d bat. 79d regt. had joined the forces under Count Walmoden, and were in one of the late severe skirmishes with the French, but suffered no loss—the 79d drove every thing before them with the British bayonet. The 2d bat. 25th, and 33d regt. are here—the other British regiments remain in Stralsund, and different reports are afloat as to their future destination. It was conjectured that they would also advance and join Walmoden's force; but was generally supposed that all the British troops were to return to Stralsund, and embark for Hanover, where the British standard was again to be hoisted; however nothing was certain.

Colonel Gore, 33d regt. is appointed Brig.-Gen. and third in command under Gen. Gibbs—he has appointed Capt Pegan, 33d regt. his Brigade Major. The British troops like Rostock, considering it more comfortable, and are in hopes to winter there.

A strong detachment of the 65th regt. under the command of Col. Fitzimons, with a proportionate number of Officers, are to embark the latter end of this month, from Hull, for the Isle of Wight, to embark in the January fleet, to join the Regt. on the Bombay Establishment. Col. Fitzimons is to take the command of the Regt. when Col. L. Smyth will return to Europe.

A detachment of the 34th regt. is also to embark in the above fleet, to join the 1st bat. on the Madras Establishment.
