None of the villains have yet been taken, and diligent search is making after them. We understand they cut a pannel out of the window-shut-ter by which means they entered the house.

Lord Castlemaine has received a number of threatening letters in consequence of his unceasing endeavours in the Co. Westmeath to bring the criminals to justice; and, from the terrible example they have already made of some who have incurred their displeasure, his Lordship has every reason to believe that his efforts are not meant to be in vain; but he has sacrificed every motive of personal security to the public welfare.
