The London Papers of Tuesday and Wednesday last
just reached us by Express, and the following is
the substance:

Letters have been received from the Marquis of
Wellington, dated St. Jean de Luz, 22d and 28th Nov.
On the 18th the enemy reconnoitred Lieutenant-
General Sir John Hope's advanced posts, on which
Colonel Brigadier-General Wilson was unfortunately
wounded.

Major Sir William Beresford, on same day forced
the enemy's posts across the bridge of Uriains,
and established himself there.

On the 23d, our light division advanced, but the
French got under the fire of the entrenched
cannon at Bayonne, were obliged to retire, with a
loss to the British of 15 killed, 56 wounded, and 15
missing amongst the latter, was Captain Samuel
Roberts of the 43d Regiment.

The reports from Catalonia, come down to the
15th Number, at which time nothing new had
occurred.

The Allies are concentrating their force near Ant-
werp. The Allies will soon occupy Dutch Brabant.—
The Prussians and other foreign troops are deserting
from the French, and the Danes are said to have also
abandoned them.

The important Garrisons of Breda and Williamstadt
are evacuated by the French.—Texel Island has also been
evacuated, and said Niemeugen was evacuated.

The troop wind bound at Deal and Ramsgate, sail-
ed on Monday for Holland.

The Prince Regent has appointed a day of Gene-
ral Thanksgiving, for the late numerous and splen-
did victories of the Allied Armies, to take place on
Thursday the 10th of January next.

On Saturday last, Colonel R. A. Dalzell, was
appointed to the post of Levee, on his being appointed
Deputy Adjutant General of Ireland.—The follow-
ing were on the same day presented to his Royal
Highness, Major-General Conran, on his return from
India; Sir Charles Saxton, Bart. by the Duke of
Richmond; Colonel Handfield; Capt. O'Brien, on
his promotion and return from five years captivity
in France; Major-General Smyth, on his return
from Canada; and Hon. R. B. Bernard, on his arrival
from Ireland.
