The Earl and Countess Clare, the Earl and Coun-
tess Limerick, were at the Prince Regent's grand
Ball on Wednesday.

A valuable Coal Mine has been lately discovered
on the estate of Thomas Fitzgibbon, Esq. near
Rathkeale, in this county.

Eight journeymen Coopers, were convicted on
Monday last, before the Mayor and Aldermen Moore
and Morgan, in Waterford, for combination, and
were each sentenced to six months imprisonment.

The House of Darby Dwyer, of Doraville, near
Cappa, County Tipperary, was on Sunday se'nnight
attacked by several fellows, who robbed him of a
gun and 95 guineas, and took off his daughter—A
man named John Dwyer was committed on Monday
to Clonmel jail, charged with the above offence.

A most extraordinary operation has lately been
performed in this City;—a Female about the age of
50 who had for years laboured under a constant
head-ache, which (notwithstanding the use of every
remedy suggested to her) continued to increase, and
at length attained to that degree of violence, that it
became necessary to *remove a portion of the Scull,*
the entire of the Forehead, and most of the upper part
of which have been taken away.—Since the operation
(about two months) the pain has entirely ceased,
her general state of health has much improved, and
she has now every prospect of a most perfect reco-
very—What is very remarkable with little or scarcely
any appearance of deformity. The above has come
within our own observation, or we should deem it
almost incredible.

Monday and yesterday the following persons were
convicted at the City Sessions, before the Worshipful
George Smyth, Esq Recorder:—

Charles O'Sullivan, for breaking the windows of
Anthony Heavenor, 6d on each indictment.

John Heavenor and *James Halpin*, for a riot and
assault on Charles and Winitred O'Sullivan, to be
confined one month, and give security.

John Spellicy, for a riot on Patrick Collopy, to be
confined three months and give security.

John Fitzgerald, for assaulting Thomas M'Mahon,
to be confined one month, and give security.

Michael Juley and *Timothy Connors*, for assaulting
James Lee, one of the petit constables of this City,
in the due execution of his office, sentenced to be
confined one month each, and until they give secu-
rity for their good behaviour.

Monday, the Mayor held an inquest on the body
of *Swintz*, late cook of the brig *Lorenzo*, of
Dublin, who fell out of the vessel at the Pool,
on the 1st instant, and was drowned—Verdict,
"Accidental Death." The Mayor also held an in-
quest on the body of *John Madden*, of Nicholas-
street, a boy aged 12 years, who, it was reported, lost
his life while amusing himself with other children,
but it appeared erroneous as from the testimony
of a Medical Person and others, the Jury returned
a verdict, "That he died a natural Death, occa-
sioned by Fever."

The Mayor, in his own name, and that of the other
Governors of the House of Industry and Hospital
for Lunatics, return sincere thanks to Mr. Eustace
Shilly, Apothecary, of Mungret-street, for his
generous and liberal donation, on Monday last, of
Twenty Guineas, by which he becomes a Governor
for life.
