The number of Houses in the County of Tipperary,  
 according to the Returns made to the Irish Parlia-  
 ment in 1791 (Vide Newenham) was 30,793.—Mr.  
 Newenham estimates the number of inhabitants, at  
 six to each house, to amount to 184,758. The return  
 made under the Population Act is 293,000 persons.  
 Surplus in 1813—108,242, arising either from en-  
 creased population subsequent to the former esti-  
 mate, or effective Return.

The population of the County of the Town of  
 Drogheda has been lately returned as 16,296,—this  
 falls short 5000 of what was generally believed as the  
 extent.

**Caution to the Occupiers of Town Lands.**—By the  
 Illicit Distillery Act, which received the Royal Assent  
 on the 20th July, 1813, and at present in full force,  
 the provision of 47 Geo. 3d.—48 Geo. 3d, which  
 were repealed by the 52d Geo. 3d shall be revived,  
 except as to living parishes or other districts than town-  
 lands

For the first offence the fine is 25l.—Second offence  
 40l.—And third offence 60l.

In Market towns the fines shall be laid on the distil-  
 lery and the abating houses.

When an illegal still is found on the borders of two  
 or more Townlands, a fine shall be imposed on all.

Five hundred pounds penalty on persons placing un-  
 licensed stills, or guilty of any fraudulent practice,  
 where by Townlands, &c.—shall become liable to fines.
