

intelligence, they broke up under the command of Captain Von Blankenberg. The enemy first from Wilwerdt, back to Farmsum, marched with his whole force, over the river to fall on our flank. An obstinate and bloody place between the Prussians, who were supported by about 40 Dutch Volunteers, under the command of Captain Lavalette, the French being on all sides, and it was only from the fire from Farmsum, that they were in safety. Although they increased to at least 5000 men, and 50 cavalry, they were nevertheless driven under the walls of De'frizyl, and killed in the greatest disorder.

At the close of the engagement, which continued till about six Frenchmen killed, and at least 500 on the Prussian side one serjeant, 5 men killed, but not dangerously, and one Hussar's sudden landstrom stood in reserve in sight. The enemy's intention of plundering the villages, to which measure he was driven for want of provision in the fortress, was completely frustrated.

7. 2.—All Germany has risen to compel the enemy to peace by force of arms; exulting in the success of Austria, Russia, Prussia, and the German Princes will bring forward by the 1st of February. Bavaria furnishes 100,000 men, besides the landwehr; the small States will bring 10,000 men under arms; Prussia, Brunswick, notwithstanding all they have done by the calls on them, will bring more men to the field than they have ever done before.

As the nations are convinced, that it is necessary to strike the great stroke, which is for a secure peace and tranquility, and restore the balance of power to Europe. There are so many great but that all are ready to make the event the horrors of a French dominion in the Low Countries, and cause industry, science, the arts, and civil and religious liberty to flourish, and establish their blessings for ever.—If the Almighty God evidently assists us in our cause, and shall we suffer ours to lay idle?

The Allied Powers have given orders for the return of the Dutch prisoners of war, and their return to their native country, which they herewith make with a warm participation in the joy it will afford their hitherto sorrowing parents and relatives.

Every reason to expect most important accretions to the next arrivals from Lord Wellington, and the quarters of the Northern Allied Army, particularly the former, as all the private accounts to date concur in representing the necessity of a change in quarters, and also in stating that arrangements were making by the Gallant Commander for the renewal of active and extensive warfare.

Count Chabane, nephew of Talleyrand, returned from France, on a mission to the Prince of Bourbon Family, and after a conference with the King of Berrie and the Count D'Artois, returned to Paris; and it was rumoured, that these Princes were going to proceed to France. It is supposed that the mission came from the Noblesse, as it is well known that he has had no communication with his family for many years.

A letter from Cadix, of a recent date, mentions the thoughts of Lord Wellington's resigning his command were happily at an end. Suchet, it is certain, has the army of Barcelona, for some appointment

In the above Gazette, there are 42 Captains from different English Militia Regiments, and above 60 Lieutenants from the same, appointed to the Line, with temporary rank.

About 11 o'clock on Friday night last, nine or ten men armed, broke into the house of Patrick Molony a farmer, residing near Kildimo, in the barony of Kenry, in this county—they dragged him out of his bed, into a narrow road adjacent, and three of the wicked party firing at him, killed him on the spot, having lodged, in different parts of his body, about a dozen balls.—The bloody-minded ruffians also attempted to murder his son, a lad about 19 years of age, levelling two blunderbusses at him, which misfired, and he escaped. We hope that the fellows concerned in this diabolical act will be brought to justice.—The cause assigned for this outrage is, that they supposed Molony was the person who had given information lately to an active Magistrate convenient to the spot, which caused the apprehension of six villains, charged with nightly offences.

Since writing the above, we have received the following most circumstantial statement from a Magistrate residing convenient to where the murder was committed.

We much regret being obliged to communicate a most cruel & barbarous murder committed last Friday night, in the neighbourhood of Kildimo, in this Co. Patrick Molony became obnoxious to a set of ruffians in and about that village, who have for some time back disturbed the peace of the Barony of Kenry, committing the most savage and outrageous acts of barbarity, and flogging severely all persons who dare give information against them; this poor man, the father of a large family, now left destitute, having the misfortune to be suspected of giving information to the Magistrates, whereon six of these savages were committed to Limerick Gaol for a capital offence, a party of them about nine or ten in number, well armed and disguised with handkerchiefs over their heads, broke into his house on that night, dragged him some distance therefrom, and fired a volley at him; he received two mortal wounds, besides others, and was found the next morning dead, and weltering in his blood—after perpetrating this barbarous act, they returned to the house (as is supposed) to serve his eldest son in like manner, but he fortunately escaped, altho' closely pursued by them. They prepared to shoot the widow, but one, less savage than the rest, interferred, and saved her life. An Inquest was held on Monday on the body, by that active Magistrate E. V. Fitz-Gerald, Esq. in the absence of the Coroner, who did not attend, corroborates the above statement.

We are glad to find, that the respectable Magistrates, and other Gentlemen residing in the Barony of Kenry, are to meet on Saturday next, for the purpose of bringing the perpetrators concerned in the above murder to punishment, and to put down the disturbers of the peace.—See *Adv.*
