Dispatches from Lord Wellington.
"War Department, Jan. 20.
Dispatches have been received from Lord Wellington dated St. Jean de Luz, Jan. 9, from which it appears that no movement of military importance has taken place; but on the 31st inst. the enemy having sent a force on the Grave, drove in the British Brigades; turned the right of Major-Gen. Buxton's Portuguese brigade, and established two divisions of infantry on the height of La Bashli. On the 31st the 31 and 4th divisions under Sir Thomas Buxton and Sir Lowry Cole, supported by General Buxton's Portuguese brigade and the cavalry under Sir Lowry Cole, dislodged the enemy without loss on our side, and our posts were replaced where they were before."

There has been received for 450 privates and a moderate number of officers, of the 2d Battalion of the 1st West York and East Suffolk regiments, orders to embark for Ireland.
