

Mr. O'Connell then rose to lay before the Board suggestions to be made to their Parliamentary friends, touching the grounds upon which a Bill relating to satisfy the Catholics, should be framed. He vindicated the rights of liberty of conscience, and gave as the first suggestion the principle that the Bill should extend relief to all classes of His Majesty's subjects who suffered any privation of religion's sake.

His second suggestion was, that the discipline of the Catholic Church should not be infringed upon. His third suggestion was, that regard should be had to the safety of any property left for charitable purposes.

His fourth was that the laws relating to marriages between Protestants and Catholics, should undergo revision.

His fifth suggestion was regarding the Catholics; although, he said, that they deserved but the assistance from the Catholic People, yet the People should not desert them.

His sixth suggestion regarded the imperfection of the last Bill, as excluding Catholics from the Navy and the Bench.

His seventh related to corporate rights. Mr. O'Connell said, that in his allusion to the same, he wished to be understood not to include the French and Lord Netterville.

His suggestions were put singly and carried. Mr. O'Connell hoped against Saturday next to be ready with more.

The Rule granted last Term in the King's Bench, a criminal information against Alderman Thorpe, refusing Benjamin Pemberton to be admitted to the Plaisterer's Corporation, &c. was yesterday discharged with costs.
