The arrival in Cork on Wednesday, of the ship
Captain Hunter, from Passages, we are enabled
to communicate intelligence from the South of France
as the 15th inst. to which period no movement
was made by the Marquis Wellington, but every
effort was making to advance as soon as the wea-
ther the roads would permit. Spars, cables, &c.
were collecting for the purpose of throwing a bridge
across. Our army was in high spirits and ex-
pected the gallant Marshal was in very good
health and frequently took the diversion of hunting in
the French lines. The last fleet of merchant-
ships sailed from Cork harbour for St. Andero, &c.
and arrived safe.

Lieutenant-General Sir C. Green, Bart. from the
100th, it is said, is to have the 97th regt (two
battalions) vacant by the death of Lieut.-General
Rosa, Bart.; Sir G. Prevost, from 76th, is to
be the 16th, which is under orders for Canada—
Prevost's present regiment, the 76th, is to be
transferred to Lieutenant-General Chowne (late Tilson)
the heroes of Lord Wellington's army, now
Lieutenant-Colonel of the 44th.

The 2d West York and East Suffolk Regiments
arrived from the 2d battalion, 40th regiment, ar-
rived in Cork, from Chislehurst, on Tuesday, for
re-embarkation, to join the 1st battalion in Spain.
Additional Regiments of British militia are
ordered to be sent over to Ireland.

The Antrim militia have marched from Queens-
down for Perth.

The 2d West York and East Suffolk Regiments
arrived in England, from Cork, from whence the
1st and 2d battalions marched on Thursday, for Wexford; and
the latter are to march on Monday for Waterford.
The 1st Renfrew, 3d Royal Lancashire and North
York regiments have got orders to embark for Ire-
land; the Dumfries regiment have marched to Dal-
keith; the Northumberland to Newcastle (North
Yorkshire,) and the Royal Lanark to Haddington.
