

Mr. Plowden, the Barrister, who was sentenced to a penalty of £500 for a libellous publication in Ireland, is now in Paris.

The Cortes of Spain have unanimously agreed not to receive their King from Bonaparte until he takes an oath, which is to be prescribed by them to him; and have also resolved upon it, to consider all his French attendants, in whatever capacity, that may accompany him to Spain, as enemies, and will be treated as such.

The negotiations at Chillon are continued. It is supposed by many that the recent movements will have the effect of determining the Allies to yield to the demands of Bonaparte, who insists upon the boundary of the Rhine, Britain will have only then to choose between a consent, and a continuance of the war single handed.

The next meeting of the East India Directors is to be determined if Lord Herbert Windsor Stewart, late of the Bengal Civil Establishment, be permitted to return to his rank to India.

Parliament will meet on Tuesday next, pursuant to the adjournment for the dispatch of public business. The Lord Chancellor, at Lincoln's Inn Hall, and before the Justices of the Court of Common Pleas, and Mr. Justice Heath, at the Old Bailey, and received notice to be hanged for setting fire to his house in Moon-Street, Piccadilly, London, on the 11th ult. last, with an intent to defraud the Globe Insurance Company, of London, which had the sum of £400 on his interest in the House, and £1500 on the Lease of the same.

At facts and circumstances were all that could go by, as it was not to be expected in these, that any positive evidence could be obtained, as secrecy and privacy were commonly observed by the perpetrators. The Jury retired half an hour, and then returned a verdict of Death.

At the Sessions, sentence of Death was also given to six others, eight to be transported for life, and two for 7 years, & 50 to be whipped.

Mr. Kinghorn, bankrupt, prosecuted for a misdemeanor, in conspiring to defraud, was sentenced to one year's imprisonment, and a fine of £100.

An inquest was held last week by John Cox, Esq. Coroner, on the body of Thomas Flinn, of Barna, near Newcastle, Co. Limerick, whom it was supposed had died in consequence of a beating, alleged to have been given him by a person in the neighbourhood; but on the most minute investigation, and assisted by an adjacent Magistrate, it appeared that Flinn died by excessive drinking, which produced suffocation; and the Jury brought in their Verdict accordingly.

Friday night, some hardy ruffians were so daring to fire several shots at the house of Mr. Sims, the Miller, at Blackwater, Co. Clare, altho' he has had a Corporal's guard therein, for his protection, since the burglary and violence committed there in November last.

The General Post-Office it is said will actually be removed to Sackville-street, notwithstanding the opposition from several of the Bankers and Merchants.

Mr. Thomas Picasants, of William-street, has most munificently given Six Thousand Pounds to the County Dublin Infirmary. £4000 of which is to build an operation Room, and the remainder for the purchase of Wines, &c. for the sick.

The Roman Catholic Board met on Friday, Mr. James O'Gorman in the Chair, when several notices of motions were given. Thanks to Mr. Curran on retiring from the Bench. To re-establish the Independent character of the Board in the estimation of the Public, to rescind the Resolutions passed on the 24th December, which disclaimed the sentiments contained in the speech of Dr. Dromgoole.

The determination of Mr. Bryan on the late trial of Mr. Magee, was resolved upon by the Board as attributable to an error of judgment, and in consequence he has the unbounded confidence of the Board. Mr. O'Connell gave notice of a motion relative to the Londonderry Address, and concluded by some remarks against the Orangemen.

The Lord High Chancellor has been pleased to appoint Jeffery Browning, Esq. to be a Justice of the Peace for the County of Limerick.

Saturday last, Michael Scanlan, and John Cox, Esqrs. apprehended a man named Fowling, of Killybegga, in this County, charged with a violent assault on a man named Donovan, a few days previous, whereby his life is in danger. Mr. Scanlan being a Magistrate, has committed him to Ballingarry bridewell.

Edward S. Hickman, Esq. is appointed Crown Solicitor for the Connaught Circuit, in the room of Arthur Dunne, Esq.

Henry Spunner, Esq. of Corolantry, is appointed High-Sheriff of the King's County, and Mr. John Legge, his Sub-Sheriff.
