Assizes.—The City business ended on Thursday, and has proved maiden, no further convictions having taken place in addition to those mentioned in our last. Yesterday Baron Smith assisted Serjeant Johnston in the County, and disposed of all the Nisi Prius causes. The Crown trials in the County, have not yet ended, and it is thought there will be but few capital convictions; several of the prisoners charged with heinous offences, have put off their trials, until Summer Assizes.

The late Jailer and Turnkey of the County, were yesterday tried for the escape of the prisoners, on the 31st January, and were acquitted without the Jury leaving the box, it being proved that every means were used by them, which foresight could suggest; and it appearing that the principal evidence against them was Andrew Young, who is himself at this Assizes, a convicted felon, for attempting to fire at George Leake, Esq.—The Court and Grand Jury have perfectly approved of the late High Sheriff's enquiry into the escape of the prisoners, and of his unwearied attention and humanity towards those confined, as well as of the exertions he made to promote their cleanliness and comfort. A similar approval of the Assistant Sheriff was also manifested.

The Grand Jury of the City of Limerick have been pleased to make the following appointments to the City Jail:—The Rev. Henry Gubbins, to be Protestant Chaplain—the Rev. Charles Hanrahan, to be Roman Catholic Chaplain—John S. Thwaites, Esq. to be Surgeon—William Keating, Esq. M. D. to be Physician, and Mr. Charles C. S. Grace, Apothecary. Sentence passed on the City Convicts:—James Schollard, sen. for coining, to be transported for seven years—Dennis Molony, Watchman, for manslaughter, twelve months confinement—Timothy Naghton, for assault on John Conway, to be pilloried on 7th May and confined six months—Wm. Price, a Constable, convicted on two indictments for robbery, fined one mark and to give bail—John Mehan, for larceny, six months confinement—Ann Keogh, and Darby Coffey, for a riot, to give bail.

The Co. Clare Grand Jury have fixed upon Clonroad, as a site for the New Jail, which is to be built on the plan of that of Galway—the cost of it is not to exceed £20,000. County Clare Sessions will be held at Six-mile-bridge on Monday the 18th April, and on Monday the 25th April at Kilrush.

At the Mullingar Assizes on Monday, six fellows were convicted of the murder of Connell near Athlone; four of them were to be executed in the town, and the two leaders on a conspicuous hill, a few miles from the place where the murder was committed. Notwithstanding these examples during the trials, &c. while the Court was sitting, several houses were robbed of arms in the vicinity of Mullingar.

Miles Neal, William Clarke, Laughlin White, Thomas Burke, Michael Fox, James Burke, Christopher Malone and James Fox, were sentenced, fasting the following oath:—"That they would be true to Bonaparte, aid and assist to plant the Tree of Liberty in Ireland; also to destroy the magazine at Athlone; and that they would be ready to put the cruelest death, any person who gave information against them."

The Calendar of the Co. Tipperary contains 160 passages last some transports arrived at Cove Passages, which were bound for Plymouth, but obliged to make that harbour in consequence of contrary winds. They sailed from Passages on the 1st. and confirm what we stated in our last issue, of Lord Wellington being in possession of the sides of the Adour, and of the frigate being on board of one of the transports are 170 prisoners, who were taken in late engagements with the enemy.
