DISTRIBUTION.—The 2d April will be a memorable day in the annals of future historians. Buonaparte on the 11th, 1810, was embraced in the arms of royalty by marriage with the unfortunate Maria Louisa. On the 20th, 1814, royalty disowned him, and he was hurried from his throne to the dung-hill from whence he sprung.—The finger of Providence is here!

It is rumoured that Lord Wellington had reached Paris on the 7th, the date of the last intelligence from Paris. The circumstance is by no means improbable.

The intention of Government to dispatch all the troops that can be spared, to Canada, where they will remain, preparatory to grand attacks on the different States of America.

By the especial order of the Prince Regent, the Royal Navy is preparing to convey Louis the XVIII. to France, with the high taste which marks every act of his Royal Majesty, he has appointed the Admiral of the Fleet, his Highness the Duke of Clarence, to command her. Her compliment could not be paid to the Royal Exile. Louis XVIII. is confined at Hartwell with the gout. It is the intention to abdicate the French Throne in favour of the Emperor, who is now at Bourdeaux.

Genoa and Barcelona have actually surrendered.—The Duke of Rochfort with the fleet, have declared for Louis. It is said that Suchet and Soult have capitulated to Lord Wellington.

General Ney arrived yesterday in London, to have an audience with the French King.

The Duke of Berri sailed from Guernsey for Bourdeaux yesterday.

Last night, when every loyal heart in the kingdom was exulting in the triumph of our Allies over the traitor Saint of high treason, a felonious mob had the audacity to tear down the placards, which announced that triumph, together with the dethronement of an infamous Usurper. It could not be the work of the *Whig Party* in Ireland, which Mr. Grattan allowed, in his speech in Parliament, to have existed, that should be guilty of such a villainous act, as the French have dethroned the Usurper;—but it must be the work of the *Corsican Party*, who, we hope to see transported with their *Prince*, to the condemned Isle of Elba, some other neglected place of abode. The soldiers have been sent down to Cork, not to ship more live cattle for Passages, in consequence of the determination to withdraw the British army from the Continent.
