 system of rioting at fairs, most injurious to the peace-
 able and industrious, and most disgraceful to any
 Country it is suffered to pervade with impunity;—
 and in order to discountenance, and mark their strong
 reprobation of this atrocious custom, it is expected
 all the Magistrates and other respectable Gentlemen
 in, and round the neighbourhood of Ballingarry, will
 attend, (however abhorrent it must be to their feel-
 ings,) to see the sentence of the Law carried into
 full effect, and thus, by the infliction of condign and
 exemplary punishment on a guilty Individual, deter
 numbers from incurring a similar sentence.—On the
