 and Friday. The postage of all such Letters must
 be paid at the time of putting them into the Post-
 Office.

 of Ballingarry, he was sentenced by the Chairman
 of Ballingarry, and unanimous approbation of a very
 numerous and respectable Bench of Magistrates, to
 be publicly whipped on Whitsun Monday, the next
 fair-day of Ballingarry, through that town, from the
 turret to the extreme end of the fair-green.—It is
 confidently hoped, the infliction of a punish-
 ment so severe but necessary, will tend to
