This day, the Sligo Militia, under the command of Major Sir James Crofton, Bart. were inspected by Major-General Darby.

The greater part of the British army in Holland will soon return to England in divisions.—The first consists of the 33d, 54th, and 55th Regts. and the 1st Royal Veteran Battalion—They will proceed to Canada.

Among the regiments of Militia that have received orders to march from present quarters, on routes towards their respective Counties, are, the Kerry to Portmouth; Kilkenny to Gosport; Anglesea to Winchester; Kildare to Gosport; East Devon, and Cornish Miners to Plymouth; Cardigan and Worcester to Bristol; Rutland and Huntingdon to Norman Cross; Longford to Liverpool; and Flintshire to Chester.

An order has been issued by the Secretary at War, that all Militia Sergeants who have served 20 years, and retired upon 5d. per day, are in future to receive 6d.; ten years, 8d.; fifteen years, 10d.
