**Aggregate Meeting of Cork.**

An Aggregate Meeting of the Roman Catholics of County and City of Cork, was held yesterday, pursuant to requisition, at the South Parish Chapel; at which, as might be expected from the recent occurrences affecting the body at large a very lengthened session took place. The following have been the Resolutions which have been entered into on the occasion. They were unanimously adopted as follows;—  
Resolved—That after the enormous sacrifices we have made in the contest and struggles of Great Britain for the solemn proofs we have ever given of our attachment to the best interests of a Country, whose liberties we are allowed so limited a participation, and whilst we are happy in gratefully acknowledging the countenance and support of numbers of our countrymen of all persuasions, we cannot help notwithstanding with contempt the peevish, petulant, and illiberal attempts of a few members of the Grand Jury to prevent the emancipation of us, their fellow-countrymen, and to continue the odious and degrading political oppression of five millions of the people of Ireland—keeping up that irritation and distrust which have long disgraced and divided this country.  
That we have beheld with surprise and indignation, the unbecoming and unwarrantable interference of a secular Ecclesiastic in our temporal concerns, and we consider it due to our country, our Religion, and our Liberties, to repeat our solemn declaration, that we never consent to receive emancipation, accompanied by any conditions, which, though at first only appearing to regard Ecclesiastical Discipline, would, if acceded to, we are convinced, prove ultimately destructive of that religion, and those civil liberties, the pure preservation of which is of value far beyond our lives.  
That, as Irishmen and Catholics, we feel ourselves justly called upon to declare our lasting attachment and permanent gratitude to our venerable Prelates, who, by their rejection of the Rescript of the Vice-Chancellor of the Propaganda, manifested anew their attachment for the preservation of the purity and integrity of our Religion, and thus established another claim on the respect, veneration, esteem, and affectionate support of their flocks.  
That our best and warmest acknowledgments are particularly given to the Roman Catholic Clergy, who stood forward so creditably in defence of Irish rights, and the manly and decided firmness which has marked their declarations, reprobating the Rescript, so ingeniously conveyed to this country through an English Apostle.  
That the Right Hon. the Earl of Donoughmore, the Right Honorable Henry Grattan, be requested to bring on the discussion of our claims, during the next Sessions of Parliament.  
That our warmest and most heartfelt thanks and acknowledgments, long due, are hereby most gratefully given to William Crawford, Esq. and the other liberal and zealous Gentlemen, who have for years, and in the most of times, supported and countenanced our rights, who this day have honored this meeting with their presence."
