Feel after, wait for, the arising of his power in all your meetings, both for worship and for discipline—In conducting the weighty affairs of the Church, let us not rest satisfied with an acquaintance with the letter, but seek for that life and power which only can qualify us for rightly supporting our Christian discipline, either in our meetings, or in our private labours with our friends; remembering that "except the Lord build the house, they labour in vain that build it: except the Lord keep the city, the watchman walketh in vain."—Psalm cxxxvii. 1.

LIMERICK—JUNE 4.

The strong detachments of the 2d bat. 40th Regt. and the 2d bat. 8th Regt. are quartered in Cork, and are still under orders for re-embarkation for America.

Last week a draft from 2d battalion of the 29th Regiment, consisting of two Officers, four serjeants, and 44 rank and file, proceeded from the depot, at Exeter, to Portsmouth, to join the 1st battalion of that regiment, under orders for America, but immediately, on their arrival, were countermanded to return again to the depot.

The 99th regiment under the command of Lieut. Col. Daniel, arrived on the 20th May at St. John's, New Brunswick, for Annapolis.

This day, being the Anniversary of our most gracious Sovereign King George III. who entered into his 77th year, the morning was ushered in by merry peals from the Cathedral bells.

At noon the Garrison, consisting of a son, under Major General Darby, commanding the brigade of artillery, a squadron of the 1st King's Dragoons, Salop, 2d Lancashire, and Waterford light infantry regiments, with the brigade of Yeomanry under the command of 1st Capt. Vincent, marched to the ground near the Artillery Barracks, where they fired a feu de joie, which was answered by repeated hearty cheers from a large concourse of spectators.

The evening will conclude with the accustomed loyalty which always distinguishes the City of Limerick.

This caused some alteration and scuffling, in which Mr. Robbins received a blow of a hurley from a man behind him, on the back of the neck, of which he lingered about four hours, and the time he received the fatal blow. Thus has this amiable young man been torn from the bloom of life, from the bosom of his distracted family, by whom he was tenderly beloved, and from the circle of his friends, by whom he was sincerely regarded.

We hope and trust that every exertion will be made for the detection and punishment of the murderer—and expect to see magisterial authority used to put an end to an amusement in which the passions of our countrymen are so easily inflamed, and where any slight or sudden impulse of anger may be productive of the most fatal consequences, from the deadly weapon used in it.
