On Tuesday, in the House of Commons, the proposed Bill for the Galway Electors, was opposed and defeated by Mr. Daly. Mr. Blake was for fixing the day for the following day, but Mr. Daly would not consent to any measure which proposed an infringement on the chartered rights of Galway, or other town or city which had the privilege of incorporation; and Mr. Daly moved an amendment that the Bill be read a second time that day six weeks, which was agreed to, and so the Bill is lost.

TEMPLEBAR, JUNE 15.—Some alarm has prevailed in the last few days in this town, in consequence of a report that the vessel, with the plague on board, which was mentioned in our former paper was stated to have taken in a cargo of smallpox for Galway, had appeared and still lies off the island. Every information which has been collected on the subject, the High Sheriff has transmitted to Government. We cannot discover, from what we have heard, that it is clearly ascertained that the infected vessel is off our coast—but even though she were, such measures are taking as will, we hope, prevent any communication between her and the shore.
