Lord Palmerston said it was exceedingly painful to him to see any motion like the present, but he submitted to the House whether it was proper to bring forward subjects of this kind piecemeal. It was necessary to maintain a certain scale in the pay of the different ranks of the army, and also a certain proportion between the army and navy.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer followed in the main line of argument as Lord Palmerston, and contended that any partial attempt to raise the scale of our military establishments, beyond what the resources of the country could bear, would only lead to confusion, discontent and ultimate disappointment.

A division then took place, when there were:—For the Original Motion, 28—Against it, 32—Majority, 4. A Message from the Lords desired the attendance of the House to hear the Royal Assent given to several Members attended accordingly, and on his return, communicated the titles of the Bills.

The Speaker announced the receipt of a Message from His Majesty the Prince Regent, to the following purport:—The Prince Regent, acting in the name of His Majesty, having taken into consideration the severe distresses and sufferings of the several parts of Germany, in consequence of the devastations of the war, and the atrocities committed during the invasion of that country by the late Emperor of France; recommends to his faithful Commons the following Message on the motion of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, was referred to a Committee of Supply.

Peele presented a Petition from certain Inhabitants of Dublin, against the Bill for paving that City. The petitioners considered the improvement of their streets in this respect, to be a grievance, and had stated that the Bill would be destructive to the thousands of the poor who should, however, move that it be taken into consideration.

The House then went into Committees on the Irish Tax Repeal, the Irish Assize redress, the Irish Restriction, the Board of Works, the Sea Insurances, the Spoiled Stamps, the Scotch University, Pauper Bills; the Amendments which were ordered to be received.

Committee on the Irish Distillation Bill. The following Bills were read a second time, and ordered to be committed.—The Irish Ships, Portugal, Irish Stamp Duties, and Loan Rectification.

Arms, Irish Revenue Regulations, Land Assignments Names, and Burying in Woollen. Several read a third time and passed. Amending the Act to Regulate the Drivney Coaches, was brought up and read a

number of Petitions were presented, relating to the Slave Trade. Sir S. Ross, presenting one of them from Waterford, took the subject, and persons of all religious persuasions and opinions were respectively ordered to be read.

Preservation Peace Bill. The Bill of the Day being moved by Mr. Peete, that having received several communications, in selecting Magistrates and Clerks under the Act, from the districts in which he thought it proper to say, that he would have no local interests in the Magistrates, none but General and indisposed character would be appointed, which, if true, cannot fail in having a weight with a jury, before which the parties, we understand, will have to appear.

On Sunday night last, another attempt was made to break into the house of L. C. Nugent, of Castle Nugent, Esq. in the neighbourhood of Kilkenny. DREADFUL ACCIDENT. As the Limerick Two day Coach was passing the Circular Road near Kilmainham yesterday morning, it became retative at that awkward turn, in consequence of which, we regret to state, that Mr. Palmer, of the 23d Light Dragoons, had his leg fractured, the coachman his arm badly broken, and a poor man his ribs also fractured. The accident was entirely owing to the unfortunate coachman, Clinton, did everything in his power to avoid it; the pole was kicked away by the restive horse. By the instantaneous assistance of Surgeon Hargrove, of the Royal Horse Artillery, the accidents were set to right, the Officer taken to his barracks, and the other unfortunate man to St. John's Hospital.

ANOTHER ACCOUNT. An accident, attended by very distressing consequences, happened to the Limerick Day Coach, on Sunday morning. On turning from the Circular Road to the Main Road at Kilmainham, a place dangerous in the extreme, and where numerous accidents had previously occurred, the pole broke, and the driver in consequence, lost his command of the carriage, which upset, and the outside passengers, eight in number, were propelled with such violence, that three of them, including the coachman, had limbs fractured. The driver, (Clinton), who has driven on this road for upwards of twenty years, had his arm broken after he had leapt from the box, by the Coach falling on him. No blame whatever is imputable to him or to his employers. The number of passengers was less than the law allows, and we are assured that the quantity of luggage on the roof was very light, and by no means inconsistent with the perfect safety of the carriage. The accident, in fact, deeply as we deplore it, appears to have resulted from one of those casualties, against which it is impossible to guard. We should recommend some immediate alteration in the road at the point we have alluded to, particularly by heavy coaches, has already suggested to the Grand Jury of the county means to avoid it by the creation of a safer line.
