

Thursday last the Assizes of Waterford ended. The following were convicted and sentenced: Philip Corbett, for the murder of Francis Doyle, Esq. Ballynaboy, last October, to be hanged this day; John Powell and John Organ, for attacking a house at Knockane, to be hanged on Wednesday, the 10th instant; Walter Birmingham, for attempting to poison Stephen Hall, of Lismore, to be hanged on Saturday, the 20th instant; Patrick Michael and Maurice Mahony, for administering unlawful oaths, and turning up ground, to be transported for life.

The following persons have been convicted at the Assizes of Clonmel:—

James Kennedy, for stabbing and wounding W. Donnel on the head with a scythe, with an intent to kill him; to be hanged on Saturday the 27th of August.

Michael Costello, for a rape, and the abduction of Bridget Walsh. To be hanged on Saturday the 27th of September next.

Lancelot Ryan, for burglary and felony, acquitted of the former, and found guilty of the latter—To be transported for seven years.

Andrew Martin, for entering the house of John Corpy, discharging a pistol at, and assaulting him, and also for entering the house of Mr. Thos. Givena, of Mackana, in the Glen of Aherlow, assaulting him, and wounding his son, Mr. Mathew Givena—put off his trial till next assizes.

John Keating, for firing at Peter Smithwick, Esq. put off his trial—To remain in jail till next assizes.

Anthony Ryan, for riotously assembling, to be imprisoned six months.

The Glorious 1st of August—the day which gave stability to our Constitution, by placing on the Throne the Illustrious Family of Brunswick, under whose wise and beneficent sway this Empire has attained its present unprecedented height of honor, prosperity and renown, was celebrated in Cork on Monday, and continued the two following days, by the worthy Mayor, Sir Anthony Perrier, and the Corporation, in conjunction with the Nobility and Gentry of that County, in a manner which will be long remembered with pleasure, by those who were present at the different gratifying scenes—Monday, the Corporation, attended by General Lord Forbes, Sir Nicholas Colthrust, M. P. Major Gen. Forbes, and their Staff, with the several Officers commanding regiments; Admiral Sawyer, and the different Commodores and Captains of the Navy, in the River, proceeded from Lapp's Island, to Passage, where an elegant breakfast was ordered by the Mayor, to which 300 of the Nobility and Gentry sat down; after which the Party, in their several pleasure yachts, sailed down to Cove, where they were met by the Marquis of Thomond, Lords Doneraile and Carbery, Sir Augustus Warren, Hon. Mr. Hare, Col. Hodder, &c.—The Line of Battle and Merchants' ships in the harbour, exhibited their different ensigns, and fired several salutes—They then proceeded to the harbour's mouth, where the Mayor threw his dart into the Sea, to mark the extent of the jurisdiction of the City of Cork—By five o'clock the Party returned to Cork, and about seven, 300 of the first distinction, in City and County, sat down to a most magnificent dinner, at which the Mayor presided, and did not depart until a late hour—Tuesday was celebrated in an equally pleasant manner; the County Nobility, &c. entertained the Corporation, Merchants, &c.—The High Sheriff presided, and was supported by the Marquis of Thomond, Lords Doneraile, Carbery, &c.—On Wednesday, a magnificent Ball was given to the Ladies, and it is needless to add, that it was a most successful one.
