

Advices from Malta, to the date of the 2d ult. contain accounts from Smyrna to the end of June. At the latter place the plague raged with unabated violence, and the medical practitioners did not anticipate its disappearance until after the middle of August. From Malta we have the pleasing notice, that both here and at Gozo perfect health was restored, and so complete was the assurance of its continuance, that preparations were making on the 5th July to grant bills of Health, and to issue a Proclamation in the usual form, of the total extinction of the malady. We also understand, that on account of the new relations of Malta, under the changes that have taken place in the Mediterranean, some commercial regulations are to be derived from authority, which it is presumed will be generally beneficial to the Island. Not only Corfu, and the Ionian Islands were occupied by British troops, and much interest was attached to the future appropriation of those Colonies. The conveyance of letters was by sea to Leghorn, and from thence to land through France.

**ARRIVAL OF EAST INDIA FLEET.**

Accounts were this morning received at the East India House, of the safe arrival yesterday, in the names of the undermentioned ships, viz. from China—General Harris, Bridgewater, Princess Amelia, Hope, Marquis Camden, Walmer Castle, Marquis of Ely, Perseverance, Charles Grant, Exmouth, Warley, Ceres, Cumberland, Inglis, Atlas, other Castle, and Herefordshire. from Bengal—William Pitt, Princess Charlotte Vales, Hugh Inglis, Marquis Wellington, Carrington, Lord Melville, Northumberland, Tottenham, Lord Revere, Sir Wm. Pulteney, Union, (Young and) Vansittart, General Kid and Minerva. The China Fleet left Canton the 1st March, under the command of his Majesty's ship Phoenix, and rounded Cape 10th May, and arrived at St. Helena the 20th. The India Fleet left Bengal the beginning of July, and Point de Gaile the 2d March. Both left St. Helena on 20th June, under convoy of his Majesty's ships Floride, Phoenix, Semiramis and is sloop of war.

**Invasion of Upper Canada.**

We have again received very recent papers from so late indeed as the 15th of July. The most interesting article they contain is, the official Order, respecting the fresh irruption of the enemy in force into the frontier. We are sorry to remark, however, that the loss is stated to have been severe, and that the names of Tweedale, Lieut. Colonel Gordon of the 10th, and Captain Holland, are among the fallen. Our force consisted of the 100th regt. and the Royal Scots. After offering a gallant resistance, the vastly superior numbers of the adversary, led to Chippawa, where they were joined by the 1st Regiment from York, and we trust that General, thus reinforced, will be able to maintain against the enemy till further succours arrive. The American army is stated at 6000 men—the British at 1000.

Accounts from Ontario are very contradictory, but by the following paragraph from the Montreal Gazette, of the 9th of July—

The China ships just come to port, have brought 2,200,000 lb. of tea. Yesterday 57 British soldiers, in charge of the Provost Marshal, arrived at Portsmouth from Bourdeaux.

The Earl of March has arrived at Antwerp. Miss Mary Welchman, yesterday murdered in her house in Hanover square, by a young man who paid his addresses to her, and requested her hand in marriage, which her friends did not conceive a suitable connection—his name is James Mitchell, about 3 feet 10 inches, and no doubt, from the exertions making, but he will be apprehended.

The Duke of Wellington had an audience of the Prince Regent yesterday, at half-past ten o'clock, and remained with his Royal Highness about an hour, and afterwards took leave of his Royal Highness, and is his Grace's intention to be at Paris on the 20th instant, to commence his embassy.

The Duke of Wellington sailed yesterday for Calais. Mr. Huskisson is re-elected for Colchester.

The 95th regiment, consisting of two battalions, each about 550 strong, marched through Brighton, on Thursday and Friday, from Hilsa, for Shorncliffe Barracks.

The Sovereign Prince of the Netherlands has formally taken possession of the rich provinces of Belgium, to the great joy of the inhabitants.

Paris papers of Tuesday and Wednesday came to hand this morning. Their contents are more than usually important. The Committee appointed by the Chamber of Deputies have rejected the project of the law proposed by the King for regulating the Liberty of the Press—a Censorship had been proposed by his Majesty—it is against this interposition that the Chamber has decided, holding it sufficient that Printers and publishers be made amenable to the laws for the abuse of the freedom of the Press.

The arguments advanced on this question were chiefly drawn from the English law, as laid down by Judge Blackstone and other eminent writers. The Officers of the Corinda frigate, and of several other French ships, captured by the English, have been tried by Courts Martial, and most honorably acquitted.

An article from Berlin states, that Commissioners have set out for Dresden, to take formal possession of the whole of Saxony, in the name of the King of Prussia. From this we may infer, that there was no truth in the reported misunderstanding between Russia and Prussia on the one hand, and Austria on the other, respecting this arrangement—or, that it has been amicably adjusted.

**ANTRIM ASSIZES.**

The cause, which occupied the greater part of yesterday, was that in which Robert Tennent, Esq. was plaintiff, and the Rev. Edward May, defendant. The action was brought by the plaintiff to recover damages (which were laid at 5000.) for unlawful imprisonment. The general facts of this case are already known; the evidence having been nearly the same as that adduced at the Quarter Session, held at Antrim, on the trial of Dr. Tennent. A verdict was given for the defendant with costs. The Jury seemed to be of opinion, that each of the parties should pay their own costs; but they were instructed by the Court that this was not left for their decision.

It is stated that Sir Frederick Flood is immediately to vacate his seat in Parliament for Wexford, in favor of Cesar Colclough, Esq. of Tintern Abbey, who has just returned to Ireland, after an absence of 23 years in France.

TRALEE, AUG. 8.—Yesterday evening, the Chief Baron and Baron George, Judges of the Circuit, arrived at Trawinny, where they were met by the Mayor and Corporation.

The following Regiments, having received orders of readiness for Foreign Service, are now moving towards Cork, for an immediate embarkation; all Battalions—Their ultimate destination is not known. The 3rd division of Lord Wellington's army under Gen. Colville, is daily expected in Ireland.

A very considerable reduction was made in the corps of Royal Marines on yesterday se'nnight, when 67 companies were ordered to be discharged. This force will now consist of 120 companies, including four of artillery, each company to consist of one Capt. one First Lieut. 2 Second Lieut. 6 Serjts. 4 Corporals, 3 Drums, 95 Privates, and five Boys—Lieut. Col. Venicombe, Lambrecht, Savage, Timmins, and Trumenherre, with 59 Captains, 242 First Lieutenants, and 90 second Lieutenants, are placed upon half pay. The 15 pay captains will not in future, be attached to companies. And his Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased to direct, that the following Officers be put on the retired list, with full pay:—Lieut. Cols Bidlake, Home, Cassell, James, Faryer, Graham, Kynn, and Simpson; Majors Wolfe and M'Gibbon and Lieut. Snelgrove.

The Marquis of Waterford has been pleased to appoint Doctor Briscoe, of Carrick on Suir, to be Surgeon to the Waterford Regiment, vice Smithwick, who retires.

The North Cork Regiment are not disembodied. The 97th regiment arrived in Canada from Cork, on the 16th July. The Nova Scotia Fencibles arrived at Quebec from Newfoundland on the 12th July.

The South Mayo Regiment were disembodied at Westport on Monday. The 52d Regiment at Clononey, have received orders to embark at Cove for North America. The 93d regiment is arrived from the Cape. Sir John Craddock and family, have also arrived. Sixty-seven companies of the Royal Marines were reduced on Monday.

Before day light yesterday morning, a party of armed ruffians attacked the house of Michael Molony, an industrious farmer near Meelick turnpike, Co. of Clare, and being refused some bridles and saddles which they required, they dashed in the door, rifled the house of almost of every article, and 61 guineas in bankers' notes, a quantity of linen yarn, and different articles of wearing apparel, and discharged at Molony a loaded musquet, the contents of which lodged in his left arm. Informations of the above burglary, &c. were taken on oath before Fran. Lloyd, Esq. a Magistrate of the county Clare, by which it appears that the declared intention of the party was to rob the house of fire arms.

Yesterday, Arthur Henry D'Esterre, a Coroner of this Co. held an Inquest on the body of James M'Namara, a prisoner in the County gaol, who died suddenly on Thursday last, when the Jury returned a verdict, that he "died by the visitation of GOD!" Agreeably to an invitation from the Gentlemen of the County and City of Waterford, Field Marshal Lord Beresford was entertained by a Grand Dinner at the Commercial Hotel, Waterford, on Monday. The Marquis of Waterford, Lord George Beresford, General Crowdy, &c. &c. were also invited to meet the gallant Field Marshal. The utmost hilarity existed until a late hour.

On Friday night last, Lord Manners, Chancellor of Ireland, and Lady Manners, dined with a select party at the Earl of Westmoreland's, in Grosvenor-square. After dinner Lord and Lady Manners retired in their carriage to their Lodgings at Thomas's Hotel, Berkeley-square. On entering into the drawing room, her Ladyship ordered a bottle of soda-water, which she drank, and retired to her bed-room: as soon as she reached her bed, her Ladyship dropped down and instantly expired. Her Ladyship was observed to make a hearty dinner, and seemed apparently in high health and spirits. Her amiable and much respected Lord is inconsolable for his loss.

Thursday last the valuable homeward bound West India Fleet passed Cork harbour under convoy of H. M. ship Hannibal, Capt Sir Mich. Seymour, Bt. &c. &c. 35 days from St. Thomas.
