 Yeoman Cavalry Corps, from the 24th inst.
 All Yeoman Infantry Corps are also to be disembod-
 yed, unless each Corps consists of 70 effective Pri-
 vates—but in case two or three companies wish to
 consolidate to that number, one Permanent-Serjt.
 and one Drummer will be allowed pay, as also the
 Privates that attend parade days, which in future
 are to be twelve in the year; such corps as do unite,
 must be enrolled and complete before the 24th next
 month.
 The Pay to Adjutants of the Yeomanry is to cease
 on the 31st inst.
 Brigade-Major Harding of the Limerick District is
 to be continued on full pay.
