

an extra Aid-de-camp to Marshal Lord Wellington, and proceeds to Lisbon immediately. William Thornton, of the 12th Portuguese Regiment, is ordered to Lisbon. A number of discharged soldiers from the Foreign Legion have applied for a conveyance to their native country, and the application has been complied with. We have already alluded to some disagreeable circumstances which have occurred with respect to a Regiment of Hussars.—The following is an extract from an Adjutant-General's letter to Major-General Somerset, commanding the Hussar brigade, "I am commanded by my Lord Wellington to take occasion of mentioning, that the complaints against the 10th Hussars are so generally and so extensively discreditable to the regiment, and prejudicial to the interest of the army, that it is requisite you should immediately adopt measures to re-establish discipline, which is necessary to good order, which has been allowed to relax in an undue degree, under the command of Lieut. Colonel Quinlan. Your Lordship will be so good to communicate to the Lieutenant Colonel the Field Marshal's displeasure at having to notice irregularities in his power to have prevented, and that the consequence of such breach of regulations and good order will convince his Excellency that the Lieutenant Colonel is unequal to the command of a regiment of Hussars." The Parker 19th Light Dragoons has arrived at Cork from Canada. A number of English men have within the last month expended upwards of 5 millions in the French funds. The birth day of Bonaparte was celebrated at Rouen and entertainment given by Officers on half pay, many of whom reside in the vicinity of that

place. We understand that the provision intended for the promotion of those who have passed the examination qualification to be Lieutenants, will comprehend a very large number, extending to the amount of 1,000, to Lieutenants' commissions. This extensive promotion will, without doubt, be a great relief to the present very crowded list, containing not less than 3,000 names; and it will be considered very handsome towards those who have the benefit of it.

A monument to the memory of Lord Nelson is to be erected in Norfolk; a resolution to that effect was proposed to the Grand Jury at the late Assizes by Colonel Bouverie, and seconded by Mr. Coke.

The Duke of Wellington, with the permission of the Government, has purchased the Bourghes Palace at Paris for £36,000, as the permanent residence of the British Ambassador at the Court of France.

It is understood that Sir Henry Wellesley, who spent nearly the whole war in Spain, and has obtained a return to England. He may be expected next year, and has concluded a general Treaty of Alliance with the Spanish government which is not to renew the Compact with France. There is no stipulation for the Abolition of the Slave Trade.

General Lyndock on retiring from the command of the 1st Division, issued General Orders on the 16th ultimo, expressing thanks to the several General Officers and British and foreign troops that served under him

at Cove, and brought the crew of his Majesty's late ship the Avon, the Hon. Capt. Arbuthnot, which fell in, on Sunday night, with the American vessel of war, the Wasp, as we learn, some where between Kinsale and Cape Clear. The Avon carried 18 guns, the Wasp 20. An action immediately took place, and continued for two hours and 20 minutes, when the Castilian, of 18 guns, hove in sight, which, when seen by the Wasp, she endeavoured to escape. The Castilian, however, intercepted her, and gave her an entire broadside, but was prevented from following it up, signals of distress being made from the Avon, and the Castilian had scarcely time to take out the crew when she went down.—Upon looking out for the Wasp immediately after, she could not be discerned, and it is supposed that she also sunk, the broadside from the Castilian having entirely disabled and water-logged her.

The loss on board the Avon consisted, in officers, of the First Lieut. killed, and the Capt. and Second Lieut. wounded, severely, but not dangerously, and in seamen, 18 killed and wounded.

It is positively stated, that the Wasp is not gone down.—The Tartarus sloop of war is in quest of her. The Wasp is over 600 tons burthen, and mounted twenty-four 32 pounders, with a complement of 300 men—the Avon was only 300 tons, had eighteen 24 pounders, and 100 men.

The Coromandel homeward-bound East India man, 500 tons burthen, laden with teas, spices and muslins, is captured by an American privateer, off Crookhaven;—20 other valuable vessels were also captured within this week by privateers.
