I was called out about eight o'clock yesterday, to see the most remarkable phenomenon I have ever beheld, a belt of white light, similar to the tail of a comet, extended across the heavens, almost from the eastern to the western parts of the horizon; I had no instrument to measure it, and therefore cannot tell its exact dimensions; nevertheless, I think that I am not far from saying that the height of the extremities was twenty degrees above the horizon, and its length was about a hundred and forty degrees, or a circle of which it was a segment, and its width about that of the rainbow. It rose in the constellation of Hercules, and terminated in that of Corona Borealis; its motion was very perceptible, and as far as the eye could judge, uniformly accelerated. Calm and quiet, and not with the general rapidity of meteors, it descended from the place where it originated, and crossed the milky way intersecting it in *beta* Cygni, and in the same direction through *epsilon* Cygni, *delta* south of Lacura, through Andromeda, *alpha* and *gamma* of that constellation, the bright star of Caput Medusae, and *gamma* in Perseus, near Auriga; all of which were obscurely seen through its radiance. It descended slowly through the south, becoming paler and paler till the intensity of its light was no greater than that of the galaxy, and disappeared, about 15 minutes farther from the Zenith, than where I first saw it, after having been visible about an hour and a half.
