Sir J. Brenton, Bart. is appointed Naval Commissioner of the Cape of Good Hope.
A one pound Bank of England note passes at Paris for 17s. 6d.
It is stated, the Wasp American privateer has arrived at L'Orient.
The Marquis of Buckingham is to be created a Duke, at the special request of the King of France.
Mr. Pennell British Consul at Bourdeaux, has not yet left London.

The Duke of Wellington's regiment (the Blues) is to continue upon its present establishment of Officers.
Lord Stewart, K. B. has given 100l. British to the Belfast Charitable Institution.
The 15th Hussars, under the command of Col. Dalrymple, disembarked at Sir John Rogerson's quay on Sunday morning, from Liverpool. This gallant regiment has lately returned from France—and notwithstanding the long and trying fatigues which the men have endured, both in that country and Spain, their appearance is very martial. This regiment was also very actively engaged in the memorable retreat to Corunna, under the late Sir J. Moore.

The 1st, or King's Own Dragoon Guards, which has been in this country for nearly three years, will arrive in town in the course of the week, to embark for Liverpool. The 15th are to replace the 1st in Clonmel, Limerick, &c. Clonmel is to be the heard quarters.

The 23d Light Dragoons arrived at Liverpool on the 5th inst. from this city. They are to be quartered in Lancashire for the present—head-quarters at Manchester.
The depot of the 34th regiment, from Hull, disembarked here on Sunday, and this morning was to leave town for Templemore, to join the 2d battalion of that gallant regiment.

The firing heard off Tramore on Monday, was from the Bacchus sloop of war, which was practising some evolutions at sea.

LIMERICK—SEPT. 17.
The 43d, 93d, and 95th regiments, which were to sail from Plymouth on Sunday last, under the command of Major-General Keane, are to rendezvous at Cork—They are bound, in the first instance, for Bermuda—Detachments for the 11th and 14th regiments go with the fleet; and it also takes 10,000 suits of clothes, & an immense quantity of warlike instruments, for the North American Indians. Circular Letters have been written to the Captains of all Cavalry Corps in this County, which were ordered to be reduced on the 24th of August, that their Permanent Sergeants will be allowed pay to the 24th of September, provided all arms, accoutrements, ammunition, and Horse furniture shall be delivered completely and perfectly, on or before the 22d inst. not otherwise, it being intended that every arrangement, according to the New Establishment, shall be perfected against that day.
Colonel Bourke who had been for a considerable time at Corunna, as British resident with the Government of the Province of Galicia, has arrived at his seat at Thornville, near this City.

...The Peace will finally throw out of employment 2,500 naval and military officers, 3,000 government clerks, and 280,000 non-commissioned officers and privates.

Wednesday, the 59th regiment marched from Cork, to Monkstown, and embarked for England. Five troops of horse artillery, and two battalions of Foot Artillery are to be forthwith reduced—and an order has been issued to discharge all privates of the Royal artillery, that are not 5 feet 7 inches high.

The Right Hon. and Right Rev. Lord Bishop of Killaloe has appointed Wednesday, the 12th Oct. for holding his annual visitation of that diocese, at the Cathedral of Killaloe, and on Wednesday, the 19th of October, for the diocese of Kilfinora, at the diocese of Kilfinora.

To-morrow, the Rt. Rev. Ed. Bishop of Limerick will hold an ordination at the Cathedral of this City. The Earl of Clare and the Hon. Mr. Fitz-Gibbon arrived at Dover on Tuesday last, and embarked for Calais.

One of the medals which was struck at the expense of Sir David Perrier, Mayor, the Corporation, and other respectable inhabitants of Cork, to commemorate the centenary of the accession of the House of Brunswick, was a few days ago presented thro' the Marquis of Headfort, to the Prince Regent, which His Royal Highness was pleased to accept in the most gracious manner.

A fine boy, aged about nine years, fell into a bog hole at Trough, near this City, on Thursday, and was unfortunately drowned.

A Farming Society for the encouragement of agricultural pursuits, was on Monday last formed at Bandon—The Earl of Bandon is elected President, Lord's Bernard and Carbery, Messrs. Jonas Stowell, and Horace Townsend, Vice-Presidents, for the ensuing year.

The 87th Regiment, 2d battalion, under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel Desbarres, arrived on Saturday at Portsmouth from Cork. Lieutenant-General the Hon. Sir L. Cole, K. B. is arrived at Enniskillen from France.

An American Privateer was seen from the harbour of Kinsale, on Monday last. It is supposed she sought refuge there from one of our Frigates which is just arrived off that Port.

Mr. Ed. Carmody has planted on the lands of Creacoragh, in the Liberties of this City, 1400 timber trees.

Alderman Watson has received Five Pounds, left by Madame Catalani, for the support of the unhappy Lunatics in the House of Industry—and the Rev. Wm. Hoare has also received Five Pounds, left by the same Lady, for the Lying-in Hospital.

Further donations in consequence of the Sermon preached last Sunday, for the House of Industry—from Mr. James Foley, by the Rev. Wm. Lewis J.S. and from Mr. Henry O'Sullivan fifteen shillings.

Thursday, His Majesty's ship Mason, Captain Anketell, arrived in this harbour, from a cruise. Lord Kildare was on Tuesday sworn into the office of Register of Deeds, &c for Ireland—Geo. Moore and Oliver Moore, Deputies.

On Saturday night, a cabin on the road side at Annerville, near Clonmel, was maliciously set on fire, and totally consumed.

Some armed villains went to the House of a Farmer named Naughtin, near Kilmallock, at an early hour yesterday morning, and called by name a man from the County Cork, whom he had employed to cut his meadow. The unsuspecting stranger arose from his bed and answered at the window, when several shots were fired at him, the contents of which were lodged in his body, and we hear that he died last night.

The Mayor, since last Publication, has sent 55 loaves of light bread to the House of Industry. On Wednesday last, the Mayor detected the Baker who attends the Co. Jail with bread, supplying the persons confined therein with 59 loaves of light bread, which the Mayor seized and gave to the prisoners.—He is determined to publish the Baker's name, if he repeats a like offence.

The Francis Eliza, Hunston; and Canada, Gregg, arrived at Cove, on Thursday last, to take on board the different convicts confined in the several Jails in Ireland, that are under rule of transportation to Botany Bay.

The Dip Gule, brinksman, from Lisbon, for Plymouth with King's stores arrived at Cove on Thursday—A few days ago she was plundered of nearly the entire of her cargo by an American Privateer off Oporto.
