BANK OF FRENCH & CO. The Lords Commissioners for the Custody of the Great Seal, on Saturday last, pronounced their judgment on the application of this Firm, which has been argued at great length by some of the most eminent members at the Bar. The object of the application was to supersede a Commission of Bankruptcy which issued against them, (but under which they have not been declared Bankrupts,) and to apply, under the provisions of the Act of the 33rd of George II. (commonly called the Banker's Act), of trustees, to whom it appeared that the Members of the Firm had executed Deeds of Conveyance, and assignment of Property, to discharge their debts exceeding the amount of their engagements by more than 100,000l. The Lords Commissioners for the Custody of the Great Seal were unanimously of opinion, that as the Commission of Bankruptcy had been issued, they had no jurisdiction to supersede the same, for the purpose of adopting another legislative remedy, and that though the petitioning Creditor had agreed to consent to superseding the Commission, yet as the Commission of Bankruptcy was for the benefit of all the Creditors, for whom the petitioning Creditor was a Trustee, his consent could not operate so as to deprive them of the remedy to which they were entitled under the Commission. The Lords Commissioners of the Great Seal, therefore, ordered that the proceedings under the Commission of Bankruptcy, which had been suspended, should be prosecuted.

Jabez Henry and Morgan Kennedy, Esqrs. Magistrates, have contradicted the statement of a private of the North Cork regiment being murdered by a soldier named Agarvan, it appearing clearly to a respectable Magistrate, that the soldier was killed accidentally, by being thrown out of a window drawn by a restive horse.

Official Despatches have been received by Capt. Wright, of the Tonant, announcing the Capture and Destruction by the British forces, of the City of WASHINGTON, the Capital of America, on the 24th of August, by General Ross's Brigade, the Commodore Barney's flotilla, a frigate of the United States, the Dock Yard, Arsenal, and all public property and buildings were demolished. This was the result of an Action on that day, about five miles from Washington, where the British were completely victorious, and our loss was only 43 killed, and 193 wounded; Captain Sir Peter Parker and the Marines were killed, the loss of the Americans was immense.

The depot of the 11th regt. landed at Waterford, on Saturday, from England, and proceeded to join their head-quarters at Athlone. A Gentleman in the vicinity of Cork, has had a letter from his son, a Lieut. in the 37th regt. dated from Montreal, stating that a report had just been spread, of an American camp, consisting of 100 tents, having been surprised, and the entire captured without the loss of a single man.

The Carmarthen Fusiliers were to embark yesterday at Newry for England. The Monaghan regt. landed at Warrenpoint, on Thursday, from Plymouth—they have arrived in Newry to do duty. The 47th regt. have arrived in Liverpool. The East Middlesex regt. marched on Thursday from Belfast to embark for England.

The Donegal regt. have arrived at Sligo, from Enniskillen. The Bedford and West Essex militia are on their march from Athlone to Dublin, where they are to embark for England. The Kildare militia are to replace them.

Major-Generals Brisbane and Power's brigades arrived at Chantilly, on the 20th August. Capt. Holland, Aid-de-Camp to Gen. Riall, who was lately taken prisoner in Canada, has written a letter to the General's brother, Arthur Riall Esq. of Clonmel, which states that his wound, tho' severe, is much better, and every hope entertained for a speedy recovery—the General was sent into the interior after his capture, and the Americans have afforded him every comfort. An exchange for the General was offered, and it is expected has been effected before this.

Thursday last, Lieut. Augustine F. Evans, of the 5th bat. 60th regt. youngest son of John Evans, Esq. arrived at his father's, Ashrow, Co. Tipperary, after six years active service in Lord Wellington's army, in Portugal, Spain, and France.

Captain Edward Fin, lately appointed a Post Capt. in the Royal Navy, arrived on Thursday, at his father's in this City, last from the Mediterranean, where, and in other parts of the Globe, his gallantry and conduct were conspicuous.

Lieutenant Foster Byrne, of the 3d D. Guards, pursuant to sentence of a General Court Martial, held at Uroque, in France, dismissed the service, and rendered incapable of ever serving again, for laying a stick across the shoulders of Lieut. Colonel (George Holmes, of the 3d D. Guards, and desiring him to consider himself horsewhipped, which he did in the presence of a Captain of his regiment, George Mansell)—Deputy Assistant Com. Gen. William Standige is dismissed the service, for using provoking and insulting language to Brigade Major Gurwood, on the 18th March, at Condon, in France.
