

They will be conveyed in three line of battle and some smaller vessels of war besides the on storeship and several transports. Corn Exchange, Mark Lane, Oct. 10.

Our arrivals of Foreign Wheat continuing very large, having a good supply of English, has occasioned a reduction of fall 9s per quarter upon the best Foreign fine old English, but the new Wheat being of inferior quality, is unsaleable. Barley is 1s. per quarter; and Grey Peas are 4s. per quarter cheaper, being a large quantity at market. White Peas are 5s. per quarter and about 2s. per quarter lower. Fine Oats maintain their prices, but ordinary Corn goes off freely, at a reduction of 1s. per quarter. In other respects no alteration.

LIMERICK—OCT. 15.

Monday last, the Kilkenny Militia arrived in Kilkenny from Cashel—they are to be disembodied on the 24th Instant.

The 1st and 9th bat. 40th regt. and York Chasseurs, sailed from Cove on Monday last, on a secret expedition, supposed for the North American coast; they are to call off Plymouth, for the 7th Fusiliers, 200 of the 85th regt. that are to join their distinguished battalion in the Chesapeake.

The 92d regt. which left Fermoy on Monday, for Cork, returned there on Wednesday last, and are to be quartered at Fermoy for the winter.

The friends of Col. Thornton of the 85th, who were reported to have been killed at Badensburgh, will be glad to find by a paragraph in our 4th Page, that he was only wounded, and was in a fair way of recovery.

The Kerry regt. of militia were to be disembodied at Tralee on this day.

The Wexford regt. did not sail from Deal for Waterford, until last Monday, under convoy of the Regatta.

The South Down militia were disembodied at Belfast on Monday last.

Lieut. Richard Blake of the 55th, is cashiered the 15th inst. for writing an insolent letter to Lieut. Col. Derick and for other unbecoming conduct to several officers of his regt. at Windsor, in August last, and particularly for insulting Capt. Clune, of the same regt. using ironical words and abusive language to him when in command of the regt.—The Court-Martial have remarked that Capt. Clune seemed to have forgotten the important and respectability of his situation as commanding officer, and were aware that he was the cause of involving Lieut. Blake in many of his present difficulties, and from his respectable character Lieut. Blake always bore the blame of the regt. the Court recommended him to the clemency of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent.

The Earl of Ormond, and the Officers of the Kilkenny Militia, have presented John Enery, Esq. a late Lieut.-Col. with two pieces of Plate, as a mark of the respectability of his services in the past.
