

The following Circular was on Monday posted at Lloyd's:—

**(CIRCULAR)**

“London, 11th Oct. 1814.  
 “SIR—I am directed by the Committee of Merchants trading with Ireland, to acquaint you that the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have been pleased to direct that convoys for the protection of the trade shall be appointed, from time to time, and as frequently as circumstances may render it necessary. Those from Ireland, to be under the immediate arrangement of the Admiral off Cork, at which place it is required that ships and vessels from Waterford shall rendezvous; that an armed vessel shall be ordered to convoy the ships from Limerick, whenever a sufficient number shall be in loading to require such protection; and that convoys shall be appointed from Belfast, to call off Newry, and also to bring the trade receive protection from Plymouth.  
 “The Committee feel it incumbent to represent, that it has been strongly enjoined upon them, by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, to recommend, in the most forcible manner, to the different parties interested, that each, as much in his power, should insist that all vessels in which he may be concerned, shall attend to these regulations, and take the benefit of the protection to be thus offered.

Friday last, the Quarter Assembly of the Corporation of this city met.—The Board of Aldermen sent down to the Commons for their concurrence in the election of Alderman Archer, (who had advanced £15,000 to relieve the Corporation in the payment of the interest due on the City Bonds) to the Treasurer of the City, at a salary of £1000 a year in the room of Alderman Carleton. Mr. Giffard opposed the election (in as much as the Aldermen took upon themselves the appointment as the Committee of 9 be appointed to ascertain the Commons previous to consulting with the Commons, and moved right on the subject. The freedom of the City was unanimously voted gratis to the Rev. Mr. Ryan, son in law of Mr. Giffard, the father of the Corporation.—A Committee was appointed to investigate the causes of the high price of Bread in Dublin, during which a sharp debate occurred between Messrs Giffard, Harty, Guinness and Madder, the latter two who are Brewers, rebutted the charges of using deleterious articles in the composition of malt liquor, which Mr. Giffard said was the cause of so many sudden deaths and paretic cases. A resolution was adopted that in consequence of the Wellington Committee declining to erect the Statue in Stephens Green, the Corporation would not set it for less than £300 a year. The usual vote of £1000 was granted to the late Lord Mayor, to whom and to the late Sheriffs the thanks of the Assembly were unanimously given.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen of the County of Kilkenny are about to confer upon General Pack and the reward which is most grateful to the feelings, and most honorable to the reputation, of the brave and illustrious soldier, by presenting him with a valuable piece of plate.

General Packenham is arrived in town from his mother's; he is on his way to Paris.

A duel was fought in Galway on Wednesday, between W. O'D'Arcy, Esq. and Joseph Bingham, Esq.—Two shots were exchanged without injury.

On Monday night, one of the legs and the tail of the horse on which the statue of King Geo II. is mounted, in Stephen's Green, were sawed thro' by some villains as yet unknown.

On the 29th ult. Michaelmas Day, Sir William Kirk was sworn into the office of Mayor of the Corporation of Carrickfergus; and John Campbell and Thomas Miller, Esqrs. into the office of Sheriffs of the ensuing year.

**TRALEE, Oct. 17.**—On Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday last, the Kerry Regt. marched in the New Barracks of this town, and on Saturday last were disembodied, under the inspection of Major General Sir William Ayllett, Bart.—The conduct of this fine Regt. was such as to procure invariably for them universal esteem and approbation in all their quartets, and for the interior economy of the Regt. and the correct state of the accounts, &c we need not adduce a stronger proof than the instance of their arriving on Wednesday, and being dismissed on the Saturday following without a murmur or shadow of complaint on the part of any one of the men of the Regt. who withdrew in the most orderly manner, and evinced in their subsequent conduct, the most correct demeanor, after being removed from the restraint of military discipline. Yesterday, the Officers of the Regt. assembled, and returned their thanks to the Paymaster of the Regt. Captain Orpen, for his very gentlemanly conduct and friendly attention at all times experienced by them, which was accompanied by a suitable mark of their esteem for that meritorious officer.—*Kerry Evening Post.*

The following Letter was on Wednesday forwarded from the War Office, dated 12th Oct. 1814, to the different Officers commanding the 2d Battalions which are to be disbanded:—

SIR—It being intended that the battalion under your command shall be disbanded and discontinued on the establishment of the army, from the 25th inst. I am therefore commanded to acquaint you therewith, and to signify to you his Royal Highness the Prince Regent's pleasure, that you do forthwith take the proper steps to expedite the final settlement of the accounts of the battalion, to ascertain the claims of each individual belonging thereto, and to arrange any other measure that may be necessary, in order that no difficulty may occur in carrying the execution of the officer who shall be appointed to superintend the service. I am further commanded by the Prince Regent to apprise you, that it is intended that the non-commissioned officers & men, who may be referred to the 1st Battalion of your Regiment, for which purpose a recruiting or depot company shall be borne on this establishment of that battalion; that the Officers liable to reduction, who may be present with your battalion, or now in the country, shall be placed on half-pay from the date mentioned, and that such of the said Officers as are serving with the first battalion upon foreign service, shall be continued on full-pay until the respective dates of their arrival in England, after being relieved. The new establishment of the Officers of the regiment will consist of the numbers and ranks as are specified in the margin of this Letter.
