Quintin being the officer in command, did not take sufficient precautions for the success of these operations, or for the safety of the corps so employed, according to the regulations in that case, by means of which the divisions were left without orders, and their safety thus exposed.

charge alleges, that on the 28th of Feb., the day after the battle of St. Sever, the 10th Hussars being engaged with the enemy on the high road leading to St. Sever, the said Col. Quintin, in command, did not, previous to the time of action, by his presence and example, contribute to the exertions and example, contribute to the support of the different divisions so engaged, but neglected and discharged his duty as a commanding officer.

charge purports, that on the 10th of Aug., during the battle of Toulouse, the 10th Hussars being attacked by the enemy, Col. Quintin did not by his presence and personal exertions in the 2d charge.

charge is for allowing a relaxed system to prevail in the regt. which brought it into bad repute, and incurred the reproach communicated to the Adjutant-General of the Army, and to the Duke of Somerset, commanding the 10th Hussars, in which letter, or the part belonging to the Duke, has already appeared in all the publications.

for Colonel Palmer, 10th Hussars, in the course of which he performed the painful task which devolved on him, mixed with personal animosity, and without due regard to his King and Country, and he was well aware that that justice would now be sought for from the Members of the Honourable Court would be done by an impartial tribunal.

was uncommonly crowded at the trial, and from the nature of the charges, it is expected that the investigation will continue for some time.
