

take the title of Grand Duke. The future of the ex-King of Saxony is to be at the project of a Germanic Constitution and Russia is said to be finally rejected. The Emperor of Austria is to be proclaimed Germany on the 29th of this month. Princess Louise is to have a part of the left Rhine—she is positively to be married to the King of Prussia, who is now King of Saxony. It is not said where he is to abide. The Government have at length thought of giving instructions prohibiting American vessels to enter their ports, in consequence of the True Blooded Yankee, which did so in the British and Irish Channels, and in a French harbour refitting, was obliged to cut her cable and put to sea. The greatest insults have been offered to the English gentlemen there, and at the same time every thing offensive towards the English. Whereas the Americans are caressed, and do not conceal their wish that the English should meet with every defeat in Canada—of which they don't invite either English or Irish vessels.

As seen by the Debates in the House of Commons (see 4th page) what extravagant sums have been drawn from the public purse, by Commissaries and their adherents, during the war in the Peninsula. It is stated that Government intend to prosecute persons connected with that department charged with being guilty of peculation, &c. Executions under the bonds, for the duties of the Government, continue and during three months after the expiration of the term allowed, the delinquents under such engagement, have not been allowed to pay their money, but are to be liable to penalties incident to the defalcation. Sir James Blandigham retires from the office of Chancellor of the House of Lords with a pension of 2000l. for life, and a reversion of 1000l. a year for 14 years.

Last week, the names of Sir G. Murray, of Broadford, and of Lord Niddrey, have alternately been mentioned as proceeding to take the command in America; and now the report is spread, that the Duke of Wellington has been appointed to go there.

The vessel of Wales arrived at Rome on the 31st and immediately waited upon by the Cardinals. The Duke dined with the Pope on the 4th Inst. Messrs. Young & Co. and Whitehead & Co. the exporters, are declared Bankrupts in to night's papers. Several Banking Houses in the West of England depending on these two, have failed since.

**King's Bench—Monday, Nov. 24.** The session of the Court was occupied during the day, by the pleadings in the case of Wogan against Wogan.
