NEW PIER AT HOWTH.—We are happy to announce to the public, that three galleys and four sloops from different parts, found shelter from the late storms, in the New Pier at Howth. Cargoes and crews all saved. From this happy circumstance, the utility of the Pier must appear unquestionable.

By the death of the Earl of Westmeath, the different Insurance Companies in Dublin will have to pay a sum of nearly thirty thousand pounds—his life being insured to that amount. One gentleman, a creditor of the late Earl's, will, it is said, receive of the above, twelve thousand pounds.

On the night of Sunday and Monday, the 18th and 19th ult. parties consisting of 100 men each, mostly armed, went on the lands of Glangar, in the barony of Kilmemane, county Tipperary, and feloniously drove and carried away a large quantity of stock, corn, and furniture (amounting to upwards of £400.) the whole being under seizure for rent due last May, to George W. Hodges, Esq.; the depredators fired several shots into a house where there was a confidential man of Mr. Hodges, which shots he returned, and, it is thought, with some effect—he was, however, overpowered by numbers.

MESSRS. STEVELLEY.

On Tuesday the 3d inst. a meeting of the Creditors was held in Cork; the report was read by John Swete, Esq. and a proposal made upon the part of Messrs. Stevelley, by Mr. Recorder Waggett—to the effect that 14s. in the pound would be paid to the creditors, at the following periods and proportions:—

- 6s. 8d. in.....3 months.
- 9s. 4d. in.....12 ditto,
- 4s. 0d. in.....18 ditto,

In making this proposition, Mr. Waggett made a strong and happy appeal to the meeting, representing the unavoidable expenses which would be incurred, and the consequent loss to the creditors, if a statute of bankruptcy were issued, and contrasting with that mode of proceeding the more eligible one of putting the estate in the hands of respectable gentlemen from among themselves, who would superintend it, and render every justice. We have not space to go over the sensible appeal of Mr. Waggett, but its efficacy was proved by the reception it met with.

It was enquired by Counsellor Connell whether, if the creditors were inclined to entertain the proposal just made, security would be given for the payment of the several instalments.

It was replied that the estate, (cash, bills, and landed property) was in itself security. This, however, was rejected, and after much discussion it was finally resolved that the meeting should adjourn till next Tuesday, in order to give Messrs. Stevelley an opportunity of procuring securities for the execution of the proposal made for them, which it is understood they will have no difficulty in doing. The distance of time to which the meeting adjourned, is in consequence of Mr. Stevelley's friends, who are to be consulted, being residents in Dublin.
