

perfect cargoes of cotton. They bring no account of any fighting, though it is probable some skirmishing took place as the English retired, and the loss of a few lives may have been exaggerated. The Americans, it is supposed, will seize upon West Florida, unless they should dread a war with Spain. New Orleans is said to be well fortified, and defended by 5000 Americans. The English force destined against it is said to amount to 8000.

We understand that it is agreed by the treaty with America, that immediately on the exchange of the ratifications at Washington, orders should be sent to be armed, squadrons, officers, subjects and citizens of the two parties, to cease from all hostilities.

The Treaty of Ghent consists, it is said, of eleven articles: The following is the eleventh and last article:—

"The treaty, when the same shall have been ratified on both sides, without alteration by either of the contracting parties, and the ratifications mutually exchanged, shall be binding on both parties; and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Washington, in the space of four months from the date, or sooner if practicable."

We feel a peculiar pride in noticing the very splendid manner in which our valiant Duke of Wellington acted on receiving intelligence of the signing of the Treaty of Peace with America at Ghent. The Duke of Wellington received the intelligence by express after twelve at night, before information had been conveyed to Mr. Crawford, the American Ambassador at Paris; and without an instant's delay dispatched a note to the hotel of Mr. Crawford, who had retired to bed. In addition to this polished and elegant act of politeness, the Duke of Wellington called upon Mr. Crawford the next morning, early, and with a hearty shake of the hand, congratulated him on an event which left the whole world at peace. The noble chieftain had a right to exult in the accomplishment of that scheme of universal concord to which his exertions have been so proudly instrumental. We can easily conceive the warrior's feelings; and we trust the nation which has just ceased to be our enemy, will be taught by this act, that the country of whose animosity they so injuriously complain, is ever ready to meet them on the grounds of fair and honourable adjustment.

A prosecution has been commenced by his Majesty's Attorney General in the North American colonies, against the Printer of the "Arcadian," for libelling and slandering the character of Sir George Prevost, the civil governor of those colonies.

A report was prevalent in the city this afternoon, that the Ministers have it in contemplation to abandon the Property Tax, and to supply the deficiency amounting to fourteen millions, from the sinking fund.

It appears by our advices, that off Antigua the Flag-ship spoke the Barrosa frigate, Captain M'ulloch, 6 guns, and was informed by her, that the islands ceded to the French had been surrendered to that power.

The Cassel Gazette, of the 28th of December, contains an official contradiction of a report in circulation, that the Elector of Hesse, in concert with Baden, had delivered into the Congress a protest against the union of Saxony with Prussia.

The German papers mention, that fifty couriers set out the same day in different directions from Vienna. It was immediately surmised that they were charged with dispatches containing some of the recent results of the deliberations of the Congress.

The law respecting the Liberty of the Press, was not likely to remain a dead letter in Paris. Of six persons lately tried for a libel, four, viz. a man of letters, a bookseller, a printer, and the corrector of the press, have been sentenced to five years imprisonment, the suspension of their civil rights during that time, and a fine of 5,000 francs; one to a lesser punishment, and one was acquitted.

The Gazette de France, of the 30th, after noticing the signature of the treaty at Ghent, adds, "we are till ignorant of the precise conditions, but various circumstances lead us to believe that they are equally satisfactory on both sides, and that the Americans have reason to felicitate themselves on the results of their patriotism and perseverance. Mr. Hughes arrived with a copy of the treaty at Paris on the 20th, and immediately proceeded to the house of Mr. Crawford, the American Minister. Mr. Hughes has since set off for Bourdeaux, where he will embark on board an American vessel there waiting for him."
