In addition to this polished and elegant act of ourtliness, the Dake of Wellington called upen Mr. rawford the next morning, early, and, with a hearly hake of the hand, congratulated him on an event hich left the whole world at peace. The noble hieltain had a right to exult in the accomplishment f that scheme of universal concord to which his exrtions have been so proudly instrumental.
