One thing, however, we will say, that Mr. Robinson's connexions are so honourable as forbids the slightest suspicion of their varacity; besides, it is known, that Mr. Robinson sustained such injury by a blow of a weapon on the occasion of the robbery committed on him, that he has been obliged to have recourse to medical assistance; and we must disbelieve the assertion of the Correspondent on this subject altogether, until it shall adduce better proof of what it has advanced.

At a numerous and respectable Meeting of the Agricultural interests of the County Limerick **RICHARD SMYTH, Esq. High Sheriff, in the Chair**—the following Resolutions were moved by Edward Croker, Esq. of Bullyneguard, and seconded by Thomas Rice, Esq. and carried unanimously:—

RESOLVED—That we view with the deepest alarm the reduced value of the produce of Land, and the consequent depression of the agricultural interests of Ireland

That we regret such depreciation, not only as it affects ourselves and our country, but as it involves the safety and independence of the British Empire; for we conceive that the glorious reward of the conflict in which we have triumphed may be forfeited, if England becomes dependant upon foreign countries for her national subsistence. We fear that in some future contest famine might be successful, where arms could never have prevailed.

That, considering the Landed interest as the guardian and assertor of that independent public spirit, which has exalted the fame of the empire, we deprecate the continuance of a system overthrowing at once the agriculture of Great Britain and of Ireland.

That we demand no selfish advantages—we desire no exclusive protection, for we esteem the interests of the two countries essentially and unalterably the same—As every additional acre of land brought into cultivation in Ireland, has afforded a new market for the manufactures of Great Britain, we are warranted in blending our hopes for Irish improvement with our wishes for English prosperity.

That a proportion of five-sixths of the population of our country appears from official reports to be engaged in agriculture—should the depreciated prices continue this important class of men may be deprived of their present means of support, and left without any sufficient industrious occupation.

That such an alteration is unlikely to occur without the most dangerous convulsion. That in such a case we anticipate with alarm the consequences to our national character, our national happiness, and our national security. The rapid progress of Irish improvement has been measured by the advance of our agriculture; we feel that our retrogression may be proportionate with its decay.

That petitions be drawn up on behalf of this Meeting, grounded upon these Resolutions, to be presented to both Houses of Parliament, praying their Legislative interference for the protection of the agriculture, and the security of the interests of the Empire. That our Petition to the House of Lords be entrusted to the Earls of Clare and Limerick, and that for the Commons to the Hon. Windham Quin, and William Odell, Esq. our County Representatives, whose most effectual personal assistance is requested on the Parliamentary discussion of this important question.

HIS Royal Highness the Prince Regent graciously pleased in the name and on behalf of his Majesty, and in pursuance of the power of his Majesty, by an act passed in the present Parliament, to issue an order in Council for the system by which Pensions from the Royal Hospital at Greenwich have hitherto been paid on account of Wounds, Hurts, Sickness, or other disability, and for extending to the Petty and Non-Commissioned Officers and Men, even though not disabled, the same of Pension adequate to their length of service to the rank they may have borne in his Majesty's navy.

The Fleet will see by the Scale hereunto annexed that the ancient practice of Smart Money is continued, and that the Pensions hitherto granted from the Admiralty are also continued with some variations, benevolent to the general interests of the Seamen and Marine, and that the pensions heretofore granted from G
