The villains, however, succeeded in taking off the arms consisting of a gun, a blunderbuss, and a case of pistols. There appeared to be, we do not know how sincerely, a shew of energy in the neighbouring peasantry to pur- sue the assailants; and intelligence being immediately sent in to Captain Wilcocks, the police were out at a moment's warning in pursuit of the transgressors, but when the above account came away we had not learned that any of the villains were appre- hended.

On the night of the 13th inst. the house of John Whittington, Esq. late captain of the Templemore yeomanry infantry, was attempted to be broken into by a body of ruffians exceeding 30 in number. Mr. Whittington and his whole family were absent, but the servants having been alarmed by the barking of some dogs belonging to their master, immediately supplied themselves with arms, very much to their credit, and gave the villains such a warm reception, that they hastily decamped. Two or three nights before, a poor man in the same neighbourhood was robbed of all his little property, to the amount of four or five pounds.—*Kilkenny Moderator.*

Yesterday Messrs. Wallplate, and Magher, Officers of Excise, under the direction of John Morgan Esq. Inspector General of Excise, with a party of the 13th Dragoons, detected an illicit distillery at full work on the lands of Rivers, with a vast number of large ves- sels containing upwards of 600 gallons of pot ale all of which they had most effectually spilled and destroyed on the premises. The large Copper Still, utensils &c. they lodged in the Kings Stables here, and a man of the name of Collins, who had been assisting in said distillery was committed to prison for said offence.
