The villains having overpowered Mr. Scally and his domestic, dragged them to a sand pit near the house, for the purpose of murdering them, when one of the villains seeing Mr. Scully's stustion, relented and interposed to save these two brave men. The villains, however, succeeded in taking oil the arms consisting of a gov, a blunderbass, and a case of pistols. There appeared to be, we do not know how sincerely, a shew of energy in the neighbouring peasantry to pursue the assailants; and intelligence being immediately sent in to Captain Wilcocks, the police were out at a moment's warning in pursuit of the transgressors. but when the above account came away we had not learned that any of the villains were apprebended.

On the night of the 13th 1est, the house of John Whittington, Bsq. late captain of the Templemore yeomanry infantry, was attempted to be broken into by a body of rullians exceeding 30 in number. Mr. Whittington and his whole family were absent, but the servants having been alarmed by the barking of some dogs belonging to their master, immediately supplied themselves with arms, very much to their credit, and gave the villatos such a warm reception, that they hastily decamped.
